SPICED GRAPE JELLY.

Two cups grape juice (bottled), 1-4 cup sweet cider, 1.2 teaspoon cloves, 1.2 teaspoon cinnamon, 4 cups granulated sugar, 1-2 cup commercial pectin.

Measure juices, spices and sugar into large saucepan. Mix thoroughly, then bring to full boil. Add pectin at once, stirring constantly.

You will enjoy the delicate flavor of red spiced jelly when served with venison, veal, pork, poultry and game dishes. Its vivid, sparkling color is especially tempting to the eye.

PEPPER HASH.

Twelve green peppers, 12 red peppers, 1 cup sugar, 1 head celery, 2 onions, 2 cups vinegar.

Wash peppers and remove seeds. Wash celery and peel onions. Put all through a coarse mincer, stir well and add 2 tablespoons salt.
