Miss Lenglen Off Tennis Star List

French Body Ranks Lacoste, Borotra and Cochet as Premier Stars

PARIS, Dec. 31.—The name of Suzanne Lenglen, who forfeited her amateur status by becoming a professional, has disappeared from the premier place it held for so many years in the ranking of France's feminine tennis stars. The men's French Tennis Federation, which in 1926 ranking, as decided by the French Tennis Federation, shows that Rene Lacoste, Jean Borotra and Henri Cochet, will share the honors for supremacy.

Lacoste, undisputed champion of the United States by virtue of his victory over Jean Borotra at Forest Hills, New York, last September, thus will have to divide first place with his defeated adversary and Cochet, conqueror of "Big Bill" Tilden.

Paul Forel, who joined the professional ranks with Miss Lenglen, likewise was dropped from the Tennis Federation's lists.

Suzanne's place at the head of the women players will be shared by Didi Valasto and Helen Contostavlos, French girls of Greek origin. The official ranking, which will not be published by the Tennis Federation until Jan. 1, places Jacques Bragnon in fourth place. He was partnered with Cochet in the victorious men's doubles team at Wimbledon this year. M. Landry and Jean Emile Coutieres are tied for fifth place; M. George and Gentien, divide seventh place.

LAKE PLACID, N. B., Dec. 31.—Paul Belcourt and Jake Hosere, representing the University of Ottawa, took first and second places in the figure skating competition of the sixth annual inter-collegiate winter sports carnival here today. Ted Beaumont, Royal Military College, was third.

The ski jumping competition for the Marshal Foch trophy will be held tomorrow. Canadian entries include William B. Thompson and H. James Martin, McGill; John Neville and Paul Belcourt, Ottawa.

South Shore May Have Ice League

Bridgewater and Lunenburg to Compete in Series of Games—Bridgewater to Have League.

BRIDGEWATER, Dec. 31.—At a meeting of the Bridgewater Athletic Association held in the council chamber last evening it was decided to place a team in the South Shore League. The outlook at present seems to indicate that there will be only two teams in the league—Bridgewater and Lunenburg, Chester having lost many of their players and Mahone Bay is under the handicap of having a very small rink. The Bridgewater team is at present awaiting definite word from Lunenburg as to whether they will be placing a team in the league.

Elect Officers

In the event of Lunenburg not entering a team, a plan has been proposed to have a town league in Bridgewater, composed of three teams, and in this way to develop players for the next season. The officers in charge of the Association this year are: President—Dr. F. R. Davis, Vice-President—Dr. Bruce Kelly, Secty.—R. B. Logan. Frank Powers was appointed manager of the team and Stanley Rafuse and Frank Powers were elected delegates to meet with the league officials. Considerable optimism was expressed by fans and hockey players, and it is felt that with the senior players remaining from last year's team and the addition of some younger players that Bridgewater will be able to make a good showing.

Landis Asks Risberg To Give "Dope"

Commissioner Requests Banned Player to Go to Chicago at Earliest Moment

CHICAGO, Dec. 31.—Charles (Swede) Risberg, former shortstop for the Chicago White Sox tonight was invited by Kenesaw M. Landis, baseball commissioner, to come to Chicago and formally place before him the information Risberg has been quoted in newspaper interviews as saying he can give and thereby connect with baseball scandal a score of major league players never before mentioned in connection with crookedness.

The Challenge
Risberg's fair compensation and expenses were guaranteed in a telegram Commissioner Landis sent to him tonight at Rochester, Minn. "The earlier the better," was the Landis reply to Risberg's "challenge to the Commissioner," printed in today's newspapers.

"Landis and the big bosses of baseball don't want to know the facts," said newspaper quoting Risberg, who was ousted from organized baseball in 1920 along with the other "Black Sox" of the Chicago team of 1919. "This is a challenge to the Commissioner, let's see what he'll do about it."

The Reply
The following telegram represents what the Commissioner did: "Papers print statement purporting to come from you to the effect that you can give information that will implicate twenty big leaguers who never before have been mentioned in connection with crookedness. Assuming that you made the statement, I earnestly request you to come here with the facts. Fair compensation for your time and expenses guaranteed.

"Wire collect when you may be expected, the earlier the better." (Signed) "Kenesaw M. Landis."

Navin in Conference
More fuel was heaped on the baseball bonfire today by the arrival here of Frank D. Navin, president of the Detroit Baseball Club, who slipped into Chicago unheralded for the purpose of conferring with Commissioner Landis and Ban Johnson, president of the American League.

During the day Navin and Commissioner Landis discussed the latest turn of events in the baseball scandal behind closed doors. If there were any new developments, the public must wait patiently for the facts.

"I have absolutely nothing to say," was all the information coming from Commissioner Landis when he was finally located in his office late in the afternoon.

Several Champions Are Entered in Middle Atlantic Speed Skating Championships

NEWSBURG, N. Y., Dec. 31.—With several major champions entered, the Middle Atlantic speed skating championships to be held here on New Year's Day are expected to provide brilliant competition. Charles I. Gorman, of Saint John, N. B., world's champion and winner of the Middle Atlantic crown last season, will again skate. Opposing him will be Valentine Lomas, of Lake Placid, international outdoor champion; O'Neill Farrell, of Chicago, national outdoor champion, and several other nationally known speed skaters among an entry list of 100.

Entries in the events for women include Miss Elsie Muller, of New York, who has won the Middle Atlantic title for several successive years, and Miss Leila Brooks, of Toronto, international women's champion.

N. Y. Boxing Body To Be Abolished

Bureau, Headed by One Man to Handle the Game

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 31.—The Legislative Reorganization Commission, following a three hour session, agreed to adopt Governor Smith's recommendations for the abolition of the State Athletic Commission, the State Fair Commission, and others of the less important proposals.

The Republican majority in the Reorganization Commission may postpone all action on the controversial proposals urged by the Governor until after the 1927 Legislature meets, it was learned.

The Athletic Commission which is to be abolished is headed by James A. Farley, chairman, and includes George E. Brower, Democrat, and William Muldoon, Republican. Boxing in New York State will be regulated in the future by a bureau in the new Department of State, to be headed by one man.
