Local "Y" Team Defeated Charlottetown 38-12

MONCTON, N.B., Dec. 12.—The score of the game between Moncton and Charlottetown was no criterion of the type of game. In fact the teams were very evenly matched and the play was fast and hard throughout.

The Charlottetown team played under a great handicap in wearing a strange floor with strange baskets and a limited floor space, the gymnasium being about twenty feet shorter than our own.

The big difference between the teams lay largely in the fact that the Charlottetown team was a team of individual star players who have played together for only a few weeks, whereas the Moncton squad was a star team made up of players who have played together for some time.

By a 38-12 score before a large number of spectators, the Charlottetown basket ball team went down to defeat at the hands of the local "Y" team in the Y.M.C.A. gym last evening. Both teams put up a splendid exhibition, the visitors faring the worst in failing to find the baskets, due no doubt to the size of the gym. The game was very fast and interesting and clean throughout with the exception of a slight altercation between two of the players in the second half.

Mr. W. B. Ferris, Physical Director of the Charlottetown "Y" refereed in the first half. The second half was very impartially refereed by Mr. Harry Hutton, Physical Director of the local "Y."
