—Miss Grace Romeke, Summerside, leaves Monday morning on return to Winnipeg after two months visit to friends in this Province.

—The following are the Alberton market prices, white oats 38c, black oats 40c, pork 7 1/2c, hides 7c, dressed hay \$9, loose hay \$8, beef 5 to 6c, butter 18 to 20c and eggs 22c.

—Owing to the absence of the pastor there will be no service in the Presbyterian Church, Summerside, tomorrow (Sunday) morning, but the evening service will be conducted as usual, Rev. H. M. McIntosh officiating.

—Woodland Simmons, Summerside, has purchased from John McKee, the latter's beautiful farm property situated at St. Eleanors' station, which farm Mr. Simmons, intends to use as a market garden in connection with his butcher business in Summerside.

—Dealers in Summerside, yesterday, were paying from seven and three quarters to eight and one quarter per lb for pork, eighteen to twenty cents per pound for butter, 23 cents per doz. for eggs, eight dollars per bus. for black oats and forty for white, green, chickens and ducks per lb ten cents and turkey fifteen cents.

—The special gospel services now being held at the Disciples Church in Summerside, will be continued over Tuesday the 21st. Rev. A. J. MacLeod from New Glasgow doing the preaching.
