

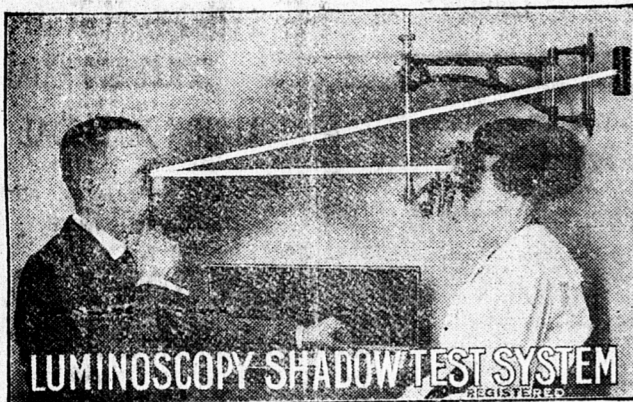

The Prince Edward Island Hospital

Interesting Sketch Outlining History of the Institution

The Prince Edward Island Hospital may be said to have had its origin at a meeting in the room of the Young Men's Christian Association, in Charlottetown, in the month of April 1883.

At this meeting a committee consisting of a clergyman and layman of each Protestant church in the City was appointed to solicit subscriptions and also to bring the matter before the people throughout the Island.

This committee held a meeting in the school room of St. Paul's Church on the 10th of July following when a circular was agreed upon to be sent to each Protestant clergyman in the Province setting forth the importance and necessity of such an institution.

The circular stated that an effort was being made to establish a Hospital in Charlottetown upon a non-sectarian basis for the benefit of the whole Province. The circular also made an appeal for subscriptions from the country. At a meeting held on August 25th the Provincial Committee reported a subscription list of \$4,067.80 from City subscriptions. At a meeting of subscribers held on September 6th, a committee was appointed to arrange for suitable premises for the new Hospital which they decided should be called the Prince Edward Island Hospital. This committee purchased a residence on St. Peters Road for the sum of \$250,000. The formal opening of the Hospital took place on Monday, the 28th of January 1884.

The subscriptions at this time exceeded \$5000. Of the contributions one of \$1200 was from Hon. F. R. Starr of Litchfield, Connecticut, U. S. A. and another of \$500 from Mrs. Cumberland of Bath, England, a lady who had many friends in this Island.

The report reaffirmed the necessity of a general Hospital for the whole Island which would not be under the patronage or influence of any particular denomination or class. On the 17th of April 1884 an Act of Incorporation was passed by our Legislature and on the 22nd of May following Trustees were elected and By-laws adopted.

The Trustees elected were William Weeks, H. J. Cundall, Archibald Kennedy, John Gillis, Richard Johnson, Charles Palmer, L. L. Beer and A. B. McKenzie.

The Hospital had only been a short time in operation when it was found necessary to provide increased accommodation for patients, and in 1888 an addition was built providing for sixteen beds in wards, a large operating room and other conveniences.

Very soon after the opening the Ladies Hospital Aid Society was established with Mrs. B. Johnson as President and their ministrations to the patients were highly appreciated. They also held an annual bazaar, raising a considerable amount to provide necessary articles for the institution.

On March 1st, 1889 a fire was discovered on the roof originating from a defective flue. When the fire was discovered all the patients were carefully removed and taken care of. Fortunately the damage did not extend below the attic, and the loss amounting to \$704.88 was paid by the Insurance Company.

who was appointed Matron in 1890 with the approval of the Medical Staff, opened a class for training Nurses and in 1894 two young ladies, Misses Sarah J. Arthur and Ella M. Tynan graduated. In 1898 Rev. Ralph Brecken donated about fifteen acres of land, including the Brecken homestead as a site for a new Hospital. A contract was let for \$12,080.00 and work was commenced in the spring of 1899. Subscriptions to the amount of \$10,443.51 having been already received.

The removal to the new Hospital was completed on the 9th of March 1900, and all parties interested gladly bade adieu to the old Hospital. The wards and private rooms were nearly all furnished by citizens of Charlottetown. In June 1900 the Trustees sold the old Hospital premises by auction for \$1500 and the amount was placed in the Endowment Fund. In 1910 in order to provide more accommodation for patients, the Brecken Home was thoroughly renovated and refitted at a cost of over \$2000 and is now known as the "Phoebe Brecken Home for Nurses."

In the years 1914-15 two new wings were added to the Hospital providing for a new kitchen, pantries, store rooms, refrigerator room, dining room, covered passage to Nurses Home, also operating theatre, sterilizing room, Anaesthetizing room, surgeons dressing room, nurses dressing room, Pathological Laboratory and fourteen private rooms with bath rooms etc.

Charlottetown now possesses one of the best, if not the very best equipped hospital East of Montreal. The cost of those additions has amounted to over \$30,000 and was rendered possible by the magnificent bequest of the late Hon. F. Ratcliff Starr. The Hospital now has sixty beds for the accommodation of patients.

The great increase in the cost of all necessities during the period of the War has been especially hard on the Hospital, and for several years the receipts have not equalled the expenditure. At the close of the year 1917-18 there was an adverse balance of \$5669.67 and in addition an unpaid coal bill of \$950.59, making a total deficit of \$6620.26.

At the annual meeting in May 1918 Mr. Percy Pope resigned his position as Chairman and member of the Board of Trustees. The new Board ap-

pointed Mr. W. K. Rogers, Chairman. There were some lengthy discussions as to the best method of securing funds to run the Hospital and pay off the large deficit. Mr. W. K. Rogers the Chairman undertook to organize the school districts in Queens and King's Counties in order that subscriptions should be collected in each. The result has been very satisfactory and the Trustees are pleased to report that during the year enough funds have been received to sustain the Hospital and the deficit has been nearly wiped out. The amount borrowed from the Endowment Fund has been repaid and the total deficit on current account now amounts to only \$628.57 which no doubt will be entirely cleared off during the coming year.
