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ZENITH WON COMMODORE CUP SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Finishing Second Behind Minagoo to Earn a High Total of 48 Points For the Series—Best Race This Year.

One of the best yacht races ever held on the harbor and easily the best race this year was the big feature along the waterfront last Saturday when the final race of a series of five for the Commodore Cup was staged.

So close was the finish that only seconds separated the first three yachts as they crossed the line, and none of them could the winner be picked.

"Foxy" John Pineau, well known designer, owner and captain of the Minagoo sailing in third position on the last beat to windward nosed Zenith on the line by two seconds, the latter in turn beating Ghost by four seconds for second position.

The Ghost was seconds ahead of Minagoo and Zenith on the line, but lost her position due to Captain Roberts' mistake of not crossing the line on the right tack.

He lost four second righting the wrong, enabling Minagoo and Zenith to sneak over by a hair.

The race between Sheba and P.No for fourth place was also exciting, the latter, however, crossing fifteen seconds in the lead, just one minute and fifteen seconds behind the leader.

Saturday's race was more or less of a game of strategy with five boats and clever helmsmen as every inch mattered as one would want to see pitted against each other. And to make matters all the more thrilling, a spanking north-west wind prevailed throughout at times giving the little 18 footers all they could handle.

On the beats it was visible centrolboards all the while. Another sight long to be remembered in this race was the splendid start. Eight craft all bunched and feeling like Trojans bearing down the line and all straining like dogs on a leash, presented a truly remarkable picture as the starter's gun barked sending them away.

At the start of the race, the Minagoo was second with 47 points, while the P.No owned and sailed by Jack King and Art Campbell and Sheba owned by "Lefty" McQuinn finished third, each having a total of 46 points.
