

SYNOD BEGAN LAST EVENING

A Large Attendance at the Opening Session
An Eloquent Sermon Preached by the Retiring Moderator—Rev. Dr. Grant, Trinidad Elected to Succeed.

The first sederunt of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces was held in Zion church last night.

Public worship was conducted by the retiring Moderator, Rev. T. Cumming, Scotsburn, N.S., who preached an eloquent sermon from the text Isaiah 21:11 "Watchman, what of the night?"

After singing the Synod was constituted by the moderator, the roll according to standing order was held as read also a list of changes.

The moderator briefly addressed the Synod referring to those who had passed away during the year and closed by calling the synod to elect a successor.

The clerk read the nominations and on motion of Rev. Robert Cumming, Westville seconded by Rev. E. D. Millar, Yarmouth, Rev. Dr. Grant was made the unanimous choice and escorted to the chair by the mover and seconder.

A vote of thanks was passed to the retiring moderator, a letter was read from the Minister of Inland Revenue acknowledging receipt of resolution passed last year regarding the erection of breweries and other communications including an

THE FAST LINE PROJECT REVIVED

By an English Shipowner now in Ottawa

His Scheme for Fast Passenger Ships with Halifax for Port of Fuel and Turbine Engines Intended.

MONTRÉAL, Oct. 6 (Special)—T. D. S. Angiers, President of the London Chamber of Shipping is in the city on his way to Ottawa to confer with the Government on the establishment of a fast Atlantic passenger service.

Mr. Angiers owns thirteen ships and is prepared to enter into a contract for service between Liverpool and Canada, with Halifax as an all-year Canadian terminus.

He would use turbine ships with oil fuel and would not attempt to interfere with the present freight carrying service.

After Twenty-one Years Mr. Ellis, Formerly of Donaldson Returns to Visit his old Home—Interviewed by The Guardian.

T. S. Ellis, one of the prosperous Islanders abroad and now a resident of Tacoma, Wash., is home on a few weeks visit to friends in the City.

In Washington state are quite a number of Island people who are prospering. The state, which is about 700,000 miles is very highly spoken of by Mr. Ellis. It is a very productive state sending forth to the world lumber, wheat, coal, gold, copper, silver, etc.

In the fertile Yakima Valley are grown as many as four crops of hay in a season. The Alfalfa sells as high as \$6.30 a ton and the yield is as much as four or five tons to the acre.

Mr. Ellis would like to see great progress especially in our city. The market, he thinks is of great benefit to the city and without it the city would be greatly impoverished.

Mr. Ellis leaves early next week for his home via Boston, New York, Washington, Chicago, Minneapolis, St. Louis and other American cities.
