SIR LOUIS TAKES A HAND.

An ideal condition of affairs political in a Federal state, like the Dominion, would no doubt divide Federal and Provincial affairs into two separate arenas, in which each would be secure against the interference of the other. A step toward this end was taken when by the action of the Provincial Legislatures and of the Federal Parliament it was decided that the members of the two classes of legislative houses should be entirely separate and distinct and that local members should not at the same time hold seats at Ottawa nor federal members hold seats in the local houses.

But at the beginning this was not so. Ontario and Quebec long after the union retained the principle of dual representation, though from the first the Liberals strenuously opposed it. In the first Canadian Parliament at Ottawa there were members sitting who were not only members of the Legislatures of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, but members of the Governments of those Provinces as well. So that we started out in Confederation with a close alliance between the federal and local parties. It did not cease with the abolition of dual representation. From the beginning of things federal in Canada there has been constant interference by federal ministers and federal opposition leaders in provincial affairs.

This practice is not one to be commended, but it has been in vogue in both the United States and Canada since the federal system of government has been established. And it is obvious that the action of one party in that regard must be largely governed by the action of their opponents. If one party by its federal leaders interferes in provincial elections the principles of fair play and equality establish that the leaders of the other party have an equal right to do the same.

We note that the Examiner condemns the action of Sir Louis Davies in addressing meetings in behalf of the local Government candidates in the Belfast and Murray Harbor districts. The objection would be well taken if the Conservative party had laid down and adhered to a policy of non-interference. But it would be unfair to permit the federal leaders of one party to intervene in local affairs and deny a like permission to the leaders of the other party.

THE GUARDIAN would gladly see all such interferences ended, but there must be one rule for both parties in such matters. Probably even the Examiner will admit that if a Conservative government were now in power, and if P. E. Island were represented in it by a cabinet minister the latter would freely take a hand in local election contests. "They all do it."

LORD SALISBURY'S SPEECH.

There is one clear and unmistakable note in Lord Salisbury's speech of Thursday night at the Lord Mayor's banquet. It is found in the declaration that there will be no interference by the great powers in the struggle now going on in South Africa, and that none will be permitted in the settlement that must follow the war. In other words the war will be carried on by Britain to a successful issue and the affairs of the Transvaal and Orange State will thereafter be ordered as Britain shall decide.

Lord Salisbury prefaces his firm declaration above given in substance, by a strong statement of the very cordial relations existing between Great Britain and the United States. Perhaps this was intended as a reminder to the continental diplomats who would read his speech at their breakfast tables the following morning, that they had been checked in their meditated interference in the Spanish American war of last year.

Lord Salisbury does not forget that there is "a certain acerbity of tone in the foreign press," but he is firm in his conviction that from foreign governments we have no hostility to fear. His language is something more than firm. Between the lines there seems to be a meaning pretty nearly approaching a note of defiance.

The Toronto Globe tells that Dawson City has now the names of streets and the numbers of buildings properly placed. This is another hint to Charlottetown people to place numbers on their shops and residences. The new directory gives the proper number for every lot front within the city bounds, so that there need be no trouble for any one to find out the figures he requires to set up. It would be a great general convenience if houses and places of business in this city were properly numbered.

Those who have been led to believe that the Ontario Government is "tottering to its fall" may be surprised to learn that Hon. Mr. Stratton, the new Provincial Secretary, has been re-elected by acclamation. There may have been local circumstances that we do not know in the constituency for which Mr. Stratton sits, but his opposed return looks at this distance as affording some evidence that the reconstruction under Premier Ross has strengthened the administration. Even his political opponents speak well of Premier Ross as a man of uprightness and marked ability.

The present condition of the Austrian Empire forms a grave factor in the European situation. There are many signs of approaching dissolution and it seems probable that the disintegrating elements are only restrained by the great personal influence of the Emperor Francis Joseph. He is now 69 years of age and much broken by the stress of political cares and domestic afflictions. The suicide of his only son, the heir to the throne, in 1889 and the more recent assassination of the Emperor's wife were terrible shocks to the devoted father and husband. The succession is not very secure, a nephew of Francis Joseph, born in 1863, being designated as heir to the throne.

The conviction and sentence of Court Esterhazy to three years imprisonment for swindling shows the character of the man in a new light. His confession that he wrote the bordereau convicted him in the public mind of perjury as well, for if he wrote the bordereau his testimony at the first Dreyfus trial must have been false. The swindle for which he is now sentenced proves him a common blackleg. The only regrettable thing about this last incident is that Esterhazy, being beyond the jurisdiction of the court, is likely to escape the imprisonment he so richly deserves.
