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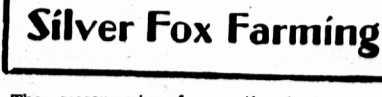

TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS CONNECTED WITH Silver Fox Farming



The season when fur auctions will be holding the limelight is pretty nearly due. From December until March will be the most active months although the coming year will not witness anything like the quantities of furs offered that have been in past years. There are many reasons for this but the principal ones are curtailed production on fur farms, fewer fur trappers in the wilds and practically no importations from abroad. It is fortunate that these conditions exist otherwise with the numerous restrictions on the trade the market would be very much on the down ward trend. Late in the year there has been a more hopeful feeling among manufacturers and retailers as witness the recent upturn in prices. Silver fox in New York and the way pink has gone into manufacture and the big demand for muskrat and other cheap furs. Yes, things are decidedly hopeful and we fur ranchers must realize this in shaping our selling campaign for the product of our ranches.

On Tuesday evening, Oct. 27, the Red Cross emergency, and Home Nursing class at Clyde River, met for their concluding session. This group of thirty five members had been ably instructed by Mrs. Walter Shaw of St. Catherine's, who spared no time or effort to make this course instructive and enterprising and many were the regrets heard that the time had come for the final class but all voiced their appreciation of Mrs. Shaw's instruction. A good attendance (22 evening) was maintained throughout and the class showed a keen and vivid interest in the instruction in all that was said and done. Nearly all of the ladies in the community availed themselves of this opportunity for Home Nursing. There is great need for women in their own homes to be equipped in the ways, judging by competent care, to the members of their families, who may be suffering from minor ailments, and also that they should know how to carry out the orders, because the very critical illnesses are often taken care of in the home, with a doctor frequently is not at intervals, and important changes in the sick one when they should be observed. This means that the attendant must be placed in a position of great responsibility, and her observations, at such a time, is of the greatest value both to the patient and to the physician. Hence, the importance of this training which provides elementary instruction in the simple care of the sick and teaches the rules of hygiene and sanitation and emphasizes the importance of the maintenance of health and the prevention of disease.

MINING

Canadian Silver Fox and Fur for October contains an advertisement which controls the J. B. Fur Farm, Edmonton, it states... "Sacrifice sale of choice foxes. Due to war conditions and uncertainty of retaining top we are closing our ranch and disposing of our proven breeders and pups at little more than cost prices. Our ranch is known from coast to coast as the best and possibly the only one to ship two consecutive years white faces, silvers and blues to every province in Canada, including a number of stars in the above announcement.

The C. R. Bollett Fur Farm in Simcoe, Ontario, is also selling out. They have some prize winning stock and the progeny of same and are evidently going clean out of the business because their equipment has already been spoken for.

The Montreal Fur Sales (Canada) Limited will hold their next auction sale of silver fox on December 7th with last receiving day December 1st, and the next auction will be December 21st with the last receiving day December 11th.

The Canadian Fur Sales, Ltd. will hold their auction on December 15th with last receiving day December 1st. That there will be turning over in the fur skins on the first of these two sales but they will have the remainder of the carry-overs of 1941 to dispose of which probably number some 12,000, and so consignments from Quebec and the Maritimes of early take-offs.

Every day we meet some one who asks us when we are going to pelt. We answer commencing December 7th and concluding around the last of December. As you know it takes considerable time to take off a large number of pelts and too much to handle in a desirable fur. The general articles have been published lately giving hints of pelting and no doubt the advice should be more widely followed because cuts and tears and indifferent curing has taken many dollars off many ranch consignments.

This season does not seem to lend itself to early pelting and most furs are from two to three weeks in the hands of the furrer up. Outwardly they look good, but that is to casual glances of the eye, but if you rub the fur up the back

"Certain tracts of marsh land were set aside in 1935 for an experiment in scientific public development of fur breeding in the wild. In 1940 the first fruits of that test were so encouraging that immediate wide expansion of the idea was deemed advisable. Today several other large areas are being so developed in various parts of the province. These changes have produced a new fur industry and a sound conservation policy, carefully administered, is the keynote of its success.

Manitoba has always produced the finest fur. Aided by scientific conservation methods, the quality is improving steadily. The industry has developed to such an extent that today Manitoba possesses the second largest fur market in Canada. There are 845 fur farms or ranches in Manitoba, and they produce in excess of 850,000 in fur in 1941, roughly one-third of Manitoba's total fur production. Fur farmers are increasing the wealth of the province every year.

"Mink stands first in popularity with the producer and for second. Some other species such as beaver, fisher, muskrat, raccoon and wolf make their appearance in small numbers in the fur farm picture. The climate of Manitoba is peculiarly adapted to the growth of luxurious fur and to successful fur farming. Chinchilla and Caracul sheep are being raised successfully in the Province."

Looking through the booklet we notice S. R. Colpitts & Sons, Salisbury, offering their 1942 crop for sale of silvers, white faces, platinum, pearl platinum, and mink, and asks you to visit the pelting pens near Salisbury and see more white-face platinum, etc. in two hours than you can see in the rest of North America. Our silvers have taken Grand Championships at New Brunswick pelt shows three consecutive years and our silvers in the 1941 pelt show averaged \$46.00.

The fox show is divided into six divisions. Division A - Standard Silver Black Foxes. Division B - Standard White Marked Foxes. Division C - Standard Silver Pearl Platinum Foxes. Division D - Standard Platinum Silver Foxes. Division E - Standard Platinum Foxes. Division F - Market Foxes.
