#### MR. G. W. GARDINER'S PETITION

Sir—The letter below was handed to the Editor of the Patriot, who declined to print it in his paper. You will confer a favor by inserting it in the Guardian.

The Editor of the Patriot:

Sir—Your report of the proceedings in yesterday's paper is incorrect. I did not commence to read a petition, neither did I withdraw. To be sure of my ground I had put down in writing what I intended to say; I read from the manuscript which is as follows:

"May it please your Lordships: Availing myself of the privilege of a freeborn British subject, I appear in His Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature for this Province, to present a petition concerning one of the Chief Officers of the Court. If it please your Lordships I shall read the petition, but as I do not see the Officer present to whom it refers, I shall if you so desire pass it up to the Court to be considered at a later day during the term, as I do not wish to take any advantage of the person concerned."

"Notice of my intention to present this petition was given by registered letter addressed to the person interested and dated June 18th, 1928." During the reading of the above the Chief Justice interposed and said that the Court had no notice of the petition and he declined to allow me to proceed. I then said that I had sent notice to the person interested, but would also comply with his decision, and I then took my seat.

At a full view in the proceedings I returned, drew up a notice to the Court, enclosed a copy of the petition, returned and handed it in to the Prothonotary, addressed to His Lordship the Chief Justice.

Stultz is taking back much literature about British aeroplane engines and planes. Miss Earhart said she bade goodbye to London regretfully. "I have had a remarkably fine time here," she declared. "The English people have entertained me as if I were a Princess. I should love to come back as soon as I can."

Governments and the Atlantic Steamship Companies with the object of obtaining a reduction in ocean rates to British immigrants to approximately £10.

### Railway Rates for Canadian Land Seekers.

The committee also recommends that measures be taken to ascertain whether the railways will restore the home-seekers' rates in effect prior to the war, making such rates effective East bound as well as West bound.

### Land Settlement.

1.—The committee have heard the evidence in connection with the experiment of the 3,000 Family Settlement Scheme now almost completed recommends that time be given to test this form of land settlement before embarking upon extended schemes of this character.

2.—The committee approved of the extension to other provinces of the tri-agreement with the British, Federal and Provincial Governments for the encouragement of Land Settlement by the British immigrants and the Government of Canada to the Canadian youth.

### Increasing Employment.

Your committee would also recommend that the Government make an intensive and comprehensive study of the possibilities of increasing industrial and agricultural development in Canada with a view to attracting capital and providing wider and increased opportunities for employment not only for our own people, but for prospective immigrants.

Your committee recommends that 1,500 copies in English and 500 copies in French of the minutes of evidence and of this report, be printed in Blue Book form, and that standing 64 be suspended in relation thereto.
