**SCOUTERS CLUB MEETING**

The Scouters meeting held in St. Peter's Hall, Thursday, May 9, discussed some very important matters concerning the spring and summer activities.

It was suggested by District Commissioner Ainsworth that collecting might well be engaged in at this time when families were moving to the country, and also that the Scout collection of magazines should still be going on. The Club promised to investigate these things further, and the attention of every Scout and Cub Leader to these activities is requested.

The Annual Scout Parade was set for Sunday, June 2nd. The parade will form up in Rochford Square. The churches of destination will be announced later.

Capt. Ings brought forward the matter of Scout and Cub Camps. The Gilwell camp is scheduled for P. E. I. this year, and the Scouters felt that there would be enough from the Island to fill our quota, and justify the holding of it here. Further particulars of the camps will be released later.

The Club decided to hold a picnic to which will be invited all other Scouters on the Island. The date, place, and program, are in the hands of a committee.

District Commissioner Ainsworth asked for the opinion of the meeting on holding a District Field Day on May 24th, as is done in a number of other provinces. A very lively discussion took place and it developed that these Scout Field Days usually occupy a full day and end up with a Council Fire in the evening. Cub and Scout events are run in separate areas. Each unit makes its own arrangements for the noon meal and supper. A canteen is available and is usually in charge of Rovers. Events are of a scouting nature only and call for teams of varying sizes from each troop.

It was finally decided that a Field Day would be held in Queens District on Saturday, June 1st, beginning at 2 P. M. sharp. As this will be the first time such an event has been held in the District it was thought best to have it for a half day only. It was unanimously decided to extend a hearty invitation to all groups in the Province to enter teams if possible. A committee consisting of A. S. M. Harry Pineau, for scouts and Akela, Ruth Vinnicombe for Cubs was appointed to make necessary arrangements and to draw up the programmes of events. This work is well under way and while the location of the events and other details are not yet complete we give a list of some of the events for Scouts so that troops may begin to brush up on their work at once.

1. Bridge Building—Simple type-square and diagonal lashings—each troop brings its own rope—ropes supplied—eight boys to a team—One team only per troop.

2. Fire by Friction—Individual competition no limit to entries. Each competitor brings his own materials. Manufactured kit not allowed.

3. Boil Billy of Water—team of three—Two entries allowed from any troop. Fire wood and container of water supplied.

4. Scouts Race Competition—Team of four two entries allowed from any troop. Staves to be carried. No watches allowed. Length of course known to judges only.

5. Signalling Competition—team of four—Semaphore and Morse—one entry only from any troop.

6. First Aid Competitions—One based on second class and one on 1st class requirements. Team of 5 one of whom acts as patient. One team for each section per troop. Personnel of teams must be different for each section. Each team to bring own equipment.

7. Tenderfoot Knot—Tying against time. Two entries from any troop. Ropes provided.

It is expected that each troop will have ready a song or stunt for presentation in the evening. Further details will be given out soon, but in the meantime lets all get to work and have our entries ready.

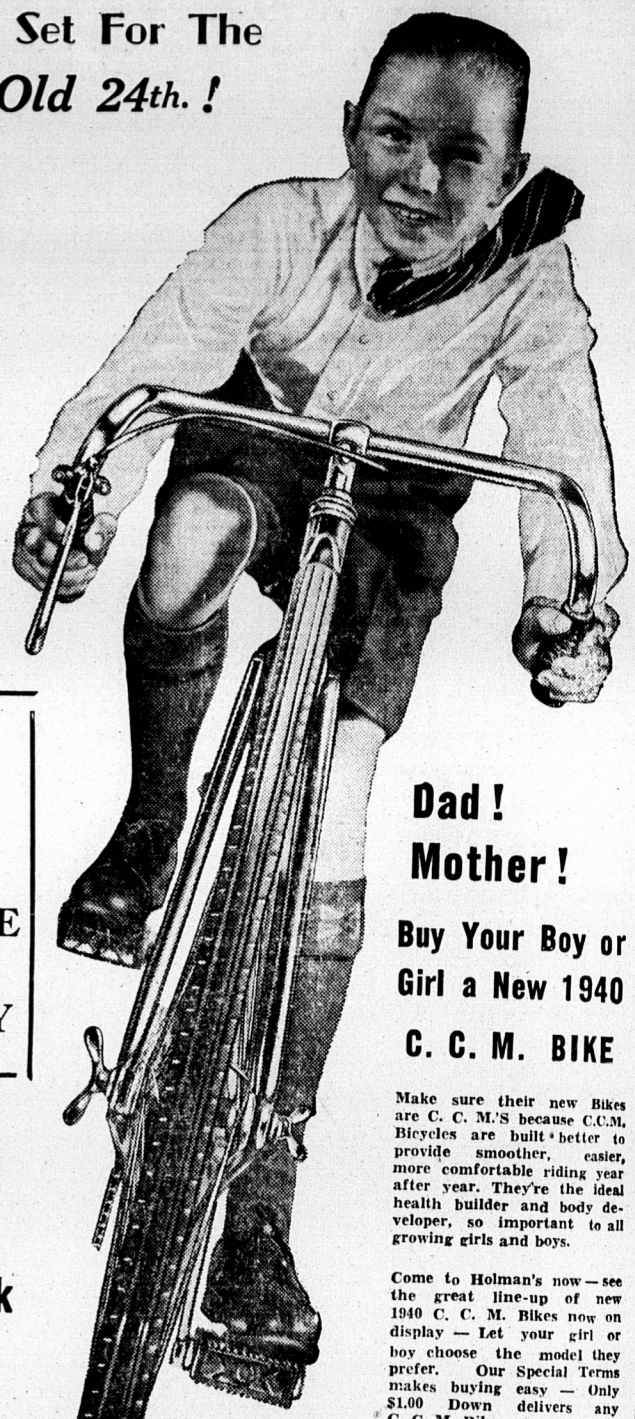
