HOUSEHOLD HINTS.—When steaming velvet try the following method: Take an ordinary colander, place this upside down over a basin partly filled with boiling water. Then cover the whole with a thick cloth, place over the gas burner and turn the gas just high enough to keep the water boiling steadily. A delicious fifteen-minute pudding is made by sifting together, one cupful of flour and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder with a little salt, add enough rich milk to make a drop batter. Steam with cherries or any fruit desired. Serve with cream and sugar. Canned fruit can be used with excellent results.
