SERIOUS FIRE.—The large and well furnished residence of Patrick Hughes, near Kinkora, was totally destroyed by fire Tuesday forenoon, between 10 and 11 o'clock. It broke out in the kitchen, Mrs. Hughes being in the parlor at the time. Her husband, who was outside noticed smoke issuing from the kitchen. He rushed to the house and succeeded in rescuing in the nick of time, his aged father, who was upstairs. The room was full of smoke and both men had a miraculous escape. The contents of the dwelling, except some of the parlour furniture, were burned, and Mr. Hughes had some money in the house, which also went up in smoke. The loss will be very heavy.

VISITING FORMER HOME.—Pte. M. S. Matheson of Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, arrived in the province on Monday evening for a short visit to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Matheson, Bradalbane, Pte. Matheson has been in Saskatchewan for twenty two years, and enlisted in 1916 with the Cameron Highlanders of Canada. He served two years in France where he went through many of the principal battles, including Passchendaele, Vimy Ridge and Amiens. He came through them all unscratched although he had the sorrow of losing two brothers there. One of them, John having died from gas poisoning, the other Angus being killed in action at Vimy Ridge, in August 1917. Pte. Matheson leaves next week on return to Saskatchewan.

SUCCESSFUL SALE.—The sale of stock at Bunbury Farm owned by Mr. J. Walter Jones, yesterday, was a very successful one, there being a large attendance. The heifers offered were sired by the bulls purchased by him three years ago in New York. Ten grade springing heifers, two years old, averaged \$133 each. Three pure bred heifers averaged \$164. Eight grade heifers a year and a half old averaged \$74. The yearlings and six months old calves did not sell well and most of them were retained to be sold next winter. Most of the heifers were purchased by Mr. D. Smith-Reid of St. John N.B. Mr. J. McDonald Charlottetown and Mr. Peter Brodie of York were the auctioneers working alternately twenty minutes each and were largely responsible for the good prices realized.

PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE.—At the Prince Edward yesterday there was shown a picture of exceptional interest—"Cheating the Public," a powerfully dramatic story of business brutality and ruthlessness, interwoven with an expose of child labor conditions and the heartless operations of a food profiteer—a picture rich in striking, realistic contrasts of poverty and luxury, of man's greed and woman's selfishness. The strong features of the production, aside from the highly thrilling scenes, of which the race at night between an automobile and an express train is one, are its admirable portrayals of human nature—its realism. The story itself is a stirring one of the experiences of a factory girl who is ground down under the heel of the business oppressor. Seeking to better a crippled child in the factory, she is soon struggling in a whirlpool of trouble which eventually sweeps her into the very shadow of the electric chair. Throughout the production runs a strong love theme and there are enough thrills presented to make a dozen successful melodramas, but the punch of the picture consists in bringing home to every one who sees it the realization that there are food profiteers on every hand and that suffering child laborers are to be found in every great industrial district. This stirring photoplay will be repeated today.
