DRAINAGE OF A GREAT CITY.

Down to the beginning of the present year Chicago drained its sewers into Lake Michigan, from which lake it received its water supply, the drinking water being taken from a point but a few miles distant from where the sewers discharged. The bare recital furnishes a sufficient reason for the undertaking of a remedy which has now been carried out at a cost of about 35 millions of dollars. In brief, a drainage canal has been cut for a distance of some 34 miles through the low ridge which separates the basin of Lake Michigan from the valley of the Desplaines River, a branch of the Illinois River, which is a tributary of the Mississippi. As a matter of fact the great drainage canal is now open and the sewage of Chicago is being washed away to the Gulf of Mexico.

Before this great enterprise could be entered upon there were many questions to be settled. There was first the international question of diverting a portion of the water from the great lake basins, lowering the level of the lakes, making the lake harbors shallower, decreasing the depth of water in the great Canadian highway of the St. Lawrence and the auxiliary canal system. This question has been held in abeyance. Then there were the rights of many cities great and small along the Mississippi, which derive their water supply from that great river. The people of St. Louis, for instance, said that Chicago, having dumped its filth into Lake Michigan till its waters became undrinkable, now proposed to do the same with the Mississippi. On their behalf action was taken by injunction to compel Chicago to forego the opening of the canal until an undertaking was given to purify the sewage before turning into the canal.

It was decided by competent engineers that the enormous plant required for the purification would cost 50 million dollars and three million dollars a year to operate it. The big suit was still pending when the canal was opened and it is now in full operation. Chicago's defence, in brief is that St. Louis turns its own drainage into the Mississippi to the detriment of the towns below and is estopped from making objection against another city doing the same or a similar thing.

Incidentally the great drainage canal supplies a navigable channel from the great lakes to the Mississippi. It is now practicable for small steamers to pass through the new canal, down the Mississippi to the Gulf of Mexico and thence around the Atlantic coast to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and back through the river, canal and lake system to Chicago again. The scheme was an audacious one, involving a vast outlay, and eight years have been occupied in constructing the work. It was purely a sanitary measure at its inception, but will have important results upon the commerce of the interior of the continent. It stands today as one of the engineering feats of the time, unique in its conception and entirely successful in securing the object aimed at.

Money for Moody's Schools.

The movement to endow the Moody educational plans has resulted in one gift of 50,000 dollars, several of 25,000 dollars and large number of 10,000 dollars, and 5,000 dollars. The total amount asked for is 3,000,000, and those in charge of raising it say no question, any longer exists that it will be all in hand within a short time.

Few Changes For 1900.

Bearings and frames are practically unchanged. Saddles are as various and as much a subject of contention as last year. But the handle bars have in many cases, received a new twist, and the upturned sort is now more prevalent, indicating that the era of sensible riding has come, and that the hump-backed scorcher is becoming a back number. Tires have been invented which are expected to take less kindly to stray pins, tacks, bits of glass, and similar bric-a-brac. As for those prophets who have announced that cycling is dead, it may interest them to know that the factories already report more orders for new machines than ever before at this time of the year. The bicycle, as a vehicle for practical use and sensible recreation, has come to stay.—Ex.

Presbyterian Protest.

Strong drink is being poured liberally into the possessions of the United States. The Temperance Committee of the Presbyterian Church thus addressed President McKinley:

"Sore disappointment has come from the discovery that a vast stream of intoxicating drink from American distilleries and breweries is being poured into our newly acquired possessions. The official records at Washington show the amount of alcoholic liquors exported to those countries has doubled in six months. The American saloon, that foul blot on our civilization, has already gone to curse those lands. In the single city of Manila are to be found more than four hundred of those breeders of poverty, vice, and crime. Whatever blessings of a higher Christian civilization we may have hoped to bring to these distant islands, it is to be feared the benefits conferred will be counter-balanced by the demoralization and ruin inflicted by the American liquor traffic."—Presbyterian Witness.
