The familiar moose head in its bright red, against a background of hemlock bark, while prominent brought out are the words "The International, The Route of Canada's new trans-oceanic Limited (during the tourist season) and The Route of Canada's fastest, in the Maritime Express (the year around)."

A CORRESPONDENT sends following additional particulars of a meeting at Clifton.—At a mass meeting of the farmers of New London held in Clifton Hall on Thursday evening 28th inst. strong speeches were made in favor of pressing on the Government, New London claim for a Branch Railway extending from Emerald to Clifton. Jas. McLeod was chairman, Geo. Simpson M. L. A., A. B. Warburton, James A. Campbell, Chas. Kieley, Leslie Woodside, Gavin Harding and others spoke on the subject and all favored the appointment of a delegation to wait on the Finance Minister when he comes to Charlottetown on the tariff enquiry, and press our claim on him. Mr. Warburton expressed himself as heartily in sympathy with the branch, saying it took precedence of any other railway work in this province. The following delegation was appointed: Chairman—George Simpson, M. L. A. James A. Campbell, James McLeod, Charles Kieley, Leslie Woodside. A motion was passed requesting that Horace Hazard and A. B. Warburton be requested to lend their assistance to the committee in preparing their case for presentation. The meeting was strictly party in character many prominent Conservatives being present and all were united in requesting that New London receive her rights in this matter.

The semi-annual examination of Pownal school was held on Thursday 28th inst. The interior was tastefully decorated by the teacher and pupils. There were between thirty and forty children present. The large number of parents and visitors also showed interest and appreciation. Rev. Mr. Chown was the principal examiner and well did he perform his part. Capt. Jones, a retired welder of the branch, and Mrs. Cameron Acorn, a past popular teacher of Pownal school, ably assisted. The examination was thorough and searching but the pupils stood the test well, showing careful training and a thorough knowledge of the different subjects taught. After the examination a well prepared and well rendered program of singing and recitations was carried out in which nearly every pupil took part. Then came speeches. Rev. Mr. Chown expressed himself as delighted with the result of the examinations and spoke particularly about the perfect order maintained throughout the proceedings. This was indispensable to good work, and he was glad to know that this was the same every day. Short but highly complimentary speeches were also made by John Smith, Wellington Young, Capt. Jones, A. A. Moore and Albert Jenkins (trustee) which must have been most gratifying to the teacher. Mr. McGregor feelingly replied thanking all for their kind words of appreciation, also tendered his heartfelt thanks to the pupils for the costly and useful present presented to him on Xmas night. He then kindly presented each child with a large package of candy, after which God Save the King by the school brought the pleasing time to a close as the shades of night began to fall.

W. C. HOBKIRK, of Charlottetown, who is the guest of Colonel J. Russel Armstrong, told a reporter that the route from Cape Tormentine to Summerside would likely remain open for another ten days. The straits were comparatively clear at present, except for "lolly" ice. He added that his authority was the Captain of the Stanley, of whom he inquired on his way over. Speaking of the petition to Sir Wilfrid Laurier for the Minto to make daily trips, Mr. Hobkirk said he left the island before it was ready for signature, but he understood that it had been very extensively signed by the leading citizens. The Islanders, Mr. Hobkirk added, were looking forward to next winter, when the new ice breaker, which is now being built in the old quarry will be ready for active service.—St. John Telegraph.

REFERRING to the mildness of the present winter, similar ones are recalled in former years. Neil McKenzie, canoeist, in conversation with The Guardian recalled some interesting facts of the winter of 1899-70. Early in that year there had been severe frost, and on Dec. 18 two men crossed the West River ice on foot. The ice had been staked for muskrat beds, but a heavy thaw following these were soon about a week later drifting out the gulf with the ice. On Christmas market day of the same year both the west and north rivers were open. A sad event which occurred on that day will be remembered by many. Two residents of North River were crossing the river in an open boat when a gale came up and both lost their lives. On New Year's day the rivers were also open, and during the rest of the winter there was only a few weeks traveling on West River ice. Mr. McKenzie says during the summer of 1899 there had been enormous crops of hay which sold that winter at 25c per cwt, and that this was the first year hay was pressed on the Island. The next year a drought followed and in the spring of 71 hay sold at \$1.00 per cwt.
