STOCKHOLM, Sept. 10.—The King of Sweden has awarded the gold medal "For meritorious deeds" to the members of the Swedish expedition, sent to Spitzbergen to rescue the Noble Expedition. The medal carries the special inscription, "The Spitzbergen Expedition 1928" and is to be worn on the chest in a light blue ribbon. Eleven of the members who took the most active part in the rescue work, including its chief, Captain Tornberg, and Noble's rescuers, Captain Lundborg and Lieutenant Schyberg, received medals of the eighth size, and the remaining members were awarded the fifth size.

Councillor Foster for the street committee, reported that the work on Prince and Fitzroy streets had been finished, and it was hoped to finish Spring Park Road by Saturday next.

During month of August thirty convictions were recorded for contravention of the Motor Vehicle Act, or City Traffic By-Law. They were:—
 Excessive speed, seven for over-speeding, seven for breach of "Stop" regulation at intersection of Great George Street, Euston Street and Elm Avenue, one for neglecting to stop motor car after collision, and one for operating motor car without consent of owner.

There were three convictions for annoying inmates of dwelling houses, two for disorderly conduct, one for common assault, two for corner loading, three for non-payment of dog tax, one for owning vicious dog, and one under the sanitary by-law. Three charges of disorderly conduct were dismissed.

Under the new by-law to regulate restaurants one restaurant keeper was convicted and fined for serving meals during prohibited hours, and one restaurant has been closed under section five of said by-law. The stalls or partitions have been removed from all city

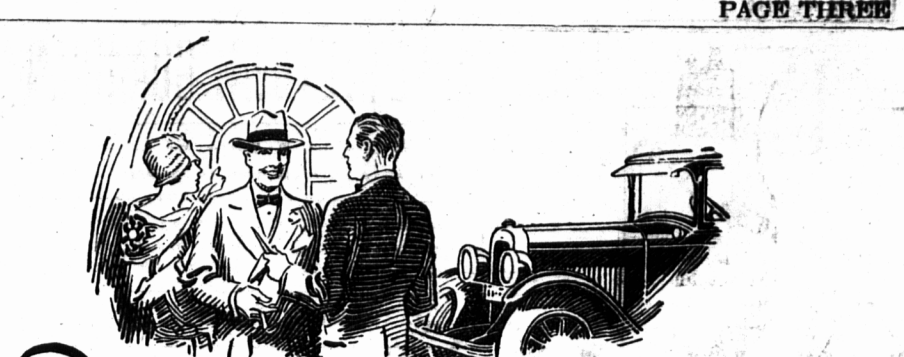

restaurants, and they now present a far better appearance than formerly. During August we assisted the Police Officers in twenty-eight searches of premises suspected of the unlawful possession or sale of intoxicating liquor. There were ten prosecutions entered, resulting in nine convictions and one dismissal. Two of the offenders paid fines of \$200.00 each and costs, and five were committed to the County Jail in default.

On August 1st the force collected thirty samples of milk from licensed milk vendors.
