Toronto Leafs Win One Game Tie Another With Rangers Over Week-End

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (CP)—Both Toronto's Toronto Maple Leafs and New York Rangers scored the winning goal late in the third period tonight as Leafs defeated the Rangers 4-3 in a National Hockey League game played before 15,221 fans.

The Toronto victory pulled the Leafs up within striking range of the fourth place Detroit Red Wings and a point separates Toronto from Wings now, while New York is deep in the cellar, seven points back of Leafs.

Neither side played effective hockey tonight with sloppy defensive work and lack of finish around the net.

Leafs' Frank McCool, in goal for Toronto, was most effective of the night by the Leafs.

Chicago Wins One, Ties One With Red Wings In N. H. L. Week-End Games

DETROIT, Dec. 23 (AP)—Overcoming a 3-0 lead, Detroit piled up in the first 28 minutes of play, Chicago Black Hawks scored twice in the second period, and three times within a 65-second span in the third to beat the Red Wings 6-4 here Saturday night before 12,532 fans, tying Montreal for the National Hockey League lead.

The loss was Detroit's third in a row, two of them at the hands of the Hawks.

Eight men shared in the Chicago point-making with centre Max Bentley scoring two of the goals within 17-second span midway of the last period. The two goals were Bentley's 18th and 19th of the season.

Montreal Canadiens Hand Boston Bruins 4-1 Defeat

BOSTON, Dec. 23 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens sped through the Boston Bruins tonight for a 4-1 triumph in a one-sided National Hockey League game before a packed 13,900 crowd at the Boston Garden. Canadiens gave goalie Bill Durnan such a rough time he did not have a shot to handle until after 19 minutes of play.

It was the Bruins' second defeat in 11 home games, the Bruins were outplayed by a wide margin all night. The Canadiens hopes for his third shutout of the campaign were only dashed halfway through the game when Bill Durnan saved the Bruins from a whitewashing by rallying in Don Gallinger's passout to complete the game's scoring.

Government House Is Gaily Lighted

Government House, the centre of His Majesty's Government in the Dominion, was brilliantly lighted inside and out with many hundreds of gaily-colored lights in recognition of the significance of the Christmas season.

Curds, strung along the vast width of the eastern side of Lieutenant-Governor J. A. Bernard's residence, literally hundreds of many-colored electric lights make the ancient abode of His Majesty's representative in this Province look like a veritable fairy-land.

On the southern side, a long, five-pointed star with each point blazing with electric lights is fastened to the top of the main door entrance on that side, 40 feet from the ground.

Along the driveway, spruce trees at regular intervals have been decorated with varied-colored lights. Inside, in the spacious hall, a huge Christmas tree, 18 feet high, is gaily decorated and illuminated. Over one of the main doorways, leading from that hall, are just below the two large pictures of the Earl of Athlone, Governor-General of Canada, and his wife, Princess Alice, is strung little branches of spruce, all wrapped and arranged in most artistic fashion.

Over the main staircase, more spruce and gaily-colored lights and festooned stars and bells are in evidence. In fact, there is not a room, doorway or the lower floor of the spacious residence of His Majesty's representative, that does not know the work of many patient and skillful hands. It would be difficult to conceive of anything which could make the venerable old residence more attractive and more in keeping with the Christmas spirit than what has already been done by Governor Bernard and his gracious lady.

Religious Uprighting

Ability that far outweighed James Charles McGulgan's modest ambition made him the youngest Roman Catholic archbishop in the world at 36 and sent him at 41 to Toronto to head the most influential English-speaking diocese of the church in Canada.

Born of devout parents near Hunter River, P. E. I., the future Cardinal early showed his inclination toward religion. From the time he first attended Mass when he was five he expressed his intention of becoming a priest. As a child his mother once related, "James always seemed to be in a book." Later in life the archbishop wrote, "I have through God's grace become a priest. It is certainly due to guidance in the first years of my life."

Walking seven miles to school to attend his education and after a brilliant career at the University of Wales and St. Dunstan's College, London, during which he won a governor general's medal in 1911, he finished his training at Laval University, Que-

HALIFAX, Dec. 23—William Arthur Reddin, B.A., LL.B., of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island was admitted to the Bar of the Province of Nova Scotia yesterday before Mr. Justice Archibald on motion of Governor General C. G. D. O'Leary, president of the Nova Scotia Bar Society.

Mr. Reddin received his early education in Charlottetown, attending Queen's School, and the University of Prince of Wales College. After one year in Southport, P. E. I., and two years in Queen's University, Charlottetown, he attended St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, and received his B.A. degree from Laval University in 1922.

Mr. Reddin then joined the staff of Prince of Wales College in 1923, where he was professor of Agriculture and Forestry at Dalhousie University in the fall of 1942.

He received the Bachelor of Science degree and the Bachelor of Laws degree from Dalhousie University in 1945.

Mr. Reddin served his articles of clerkship with J. A. Walker, K. C., of Halifax.

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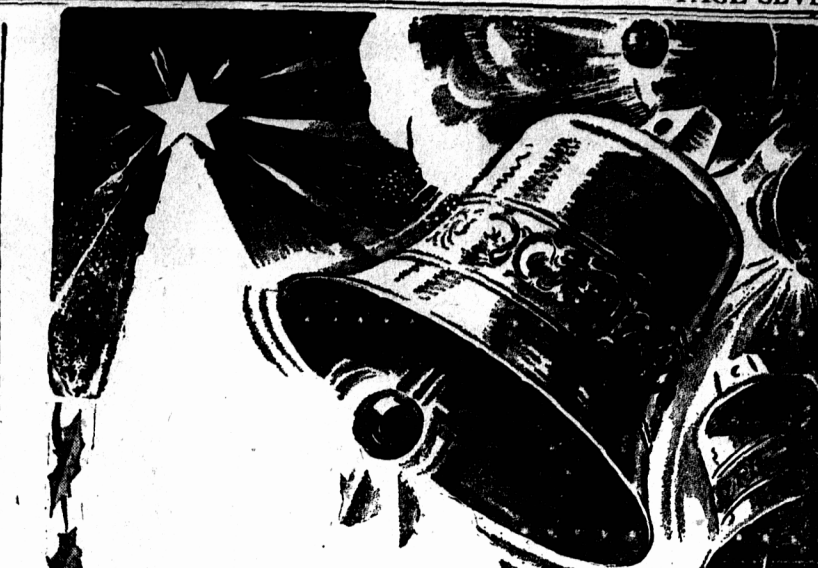
