CONSECRATION OF BISHOP O'LEARY

The consecration of the new Bishop of Charlottetown, Right Rev. Henry J. O'Leary, will, as was announced some time ago, take place in the Church of the Sacred Heart, Bathurst, N. B., on Corpus Christi, the 22nd inst., commencing at 9 o'clock, says the Catholic Register. The cards are out for the event, answers returned to Rt. Rev. William Varriety, D. D., Bathurst Village. We understand His Excellency, the Papal Delegate, Mgr. Stagni, will be the consecrator, and His Grace Mgr. McNeil, the preacher. The invitation card bears the arms of the new bishop. They bear a star, the Sacred Heart, an oak tree, the barque of Peter and a lion rampant, tower and mailed hand, all of which shows that Pius X. nominated a Sacred Heart pastor to P. E. I., where a previous Bishop (McIntyre) had for arms a barque of Peter, a prelate of Irish origin belonging to the British Empire. The motto is a pretty one: Iter para tutum—'Prepare a safe way.'

LAND OF MYSTERY

Discovery in Nigeria of 'The Sacred Lake of Life' News has been received from Southern Nigeria of a remarkable discovery just made by Mr. P. Amaury Talbot, a District Commissioner, of what is known as the 'Sacred Lake of Life,' on which, according to popular belief, the existence of a hundred thousand people depends. When, some months ago, Mr. Talbot returned from extensive travels in unknown parts of Nigeria, he announced as one of the most interesting discoveries the finding of the Lake of Life in the Oban country. This he visited after great difficulty, and in spite of the fact that porters and carriers refused to proceed to the dreaded spot. The scene about the lake, he said, was full of mystery and dread. The surface of the water was absolutely still, and round about were ten-foot high bushes, bearing what looked like great tufts of creamy flowers. These, however, proved to be nests of tree frogs. The place was a sanctuary for all wild things, for no hunter would dare to penetrate the bush to this fearsome place. Hither, the natives believed, came by night the ghosts of long dead Ekoi, to drift in sad companies, hopeless and wailing, over the surface of the water. On Mr. Talbot's return to Nigeria he found that the news of the discovery of the Lake of the Dead had brought to light the fact that another sheet of water to which mysterious powers were ascribed existed in the neighborhood of Iko-Obo, the chief town of the Ibibios, and one afternoon Mr. Talbot and Mr. Eakin, accompanied by Mrs. Talbot and her sister, set out to endeavor to locate it. Hitherto the knowledge of the lake had been kept a jealously guarded secret from all Europeans, and not even the natives, with the exception of the high priests, had been allowed to approach the sacred water—the dwelling-place of the greatest deity of the race. Access to the lake was through a sacred grove so cunningly contrived that a stranger might pass within a few yards, yet never find the holy pool. Mr. Talbot and his party, guided to the spot, found that the water was full of great fish, on the welfare of which depended the life of the Ibibio race. The fish were so tame that they fed from the hand of the reigning high priest, the only native human being allowed to look upon the water. Formerly many victims were annually sacrificed here, though at the present day human life was not permitted to be taken. Countless legends had grown up round the spot. It was said to be placed by its first guardian, the Thunder God, under the care of a python and a leopard, who ceaselessly kept watch and ward, and destroyed anyone rash enough to seek to penetrate its mysteries. It is especially sacred as the dwelling-place of the most powerful Deity—the Great Mother—whose symbol is a holy rock facing the entrance. Near by the travellers found a second pool ancillary to the lake itself. In the centre of this is a palm tree, near which, in the water, are stationed a man, a girl, and a boy, who bear the name of the goddess, as they were granted to the parents in direct answer to prayer.

WORLD'S BIGGEST SHIP TO BE LAUNCHED

LONDON, May 4.—So far the White Star Company has declined to communicate the official details of the size of its new vessel the Britannic, now being built by Harland and Wolff in Belfast, but the following are the approximate dimensions of the ship: Length, 887 feet, 9 inches; breadth, 94 feet, 6 inches; gross tonnage, between 50,000 and 51,000. The Britannic will thus, while without the length and breadth of the Aquitania, be about 4,000 tons heavier, and in respect to tonnage will also be slightly in excess of the Imperator. The Britannic will probably be launched in November next.

MRS. PANKHURST GOES TO HOSPITAL.

LONDON, May 4.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant suffragette leader, was today, with the consent of the authorities, removed from the house in which she has been staying in London to a nursing home at Woking, where she will remain under the supervision of the police. She travelled in a motor ambulance, which was followed by a taxicab conveying several Scotland Yard detectives, who were on duty to prevent Mrs. Pankhurst attempting to flee the country.

CHAMPION AID TO CUPID ON JOB FOR THIRTY YEARS.

CHICAGO, May 4.—Morris Salmonson, marriage license clerk here for 30 years, who had issued more than 500,000 licenses to wed, died yesterday. Mr. Salmonson retired from office at the age of 70 years. He had seen two generations wedded and was ushering the third into matrimony when his retirement became necessary.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 4.—Mrs. Mabel Johnson was discharged from the Pasadena hospital yesterday with the little finger of her left hand knitted on her face and doing duty as a nose. Mrs. Johnson lost her real nose in an operation. The finger tip was placed between the eyes, the bone removed to make nostrils, and now she is breathing easily.

SOONER SUICIDE THAN HOUSECLEAN.

NUTLEY, N. J., May 4.—Housecleaning is said to have driven Mr. William Brandol to suicide. He quit bending carpets in the yard of his home on Centre street yesterday afternoon and later his body was found in the water at the bottom of a deep hole in a near-by stone quarry. A note addressed to Mrs. Brandol was found in a cleft in the rocks and the message is credited as the farewell message of her husband. 'I can't beat carpets or clean house,' it read, 'and it ain't no use of you trying to make me. When

you read this I hope you will give up your habit of cleaning house every time you hear a robin sing.'

TYPHOID EPIDEMIC CAUSED BY PLUMBER.

PARIS, May 4.—The present serious typhoid epidemic in the Latin quarters, it has been found, was caused by carelessness of a plumber who misconnected the supply pipes to the recent Congress on Physical Education at the College of Medicine of the Sorbonne. Thus ordinary Seine water was furnished for drinking purposes to the assembly, the physicians, the students and the trainers. The same error in piping to a large student lodging-house brought a crop of these cases. There were seventeen typhoid deaths this week as against a normal of four.
