Carnera Scores Technical K.O. Over Spaniard

NEW YORK, March 6.—Ponderous Primo Carnera blasted out a five round victory tonight over Izzy Gastanaga, wild swinging Spaniard, in Madison Square Garden.

The huge Italian, scaling 268 1-4 was awarded a technical knockout when Referee Arthur Donovan stopped the fight because of the condition of Gastanaga's damaged left eye. The Spaniard scaled 208 1-4.

After vainly trying to break down Carnera's cumbersome defence with looping body blows, Gastanaga suffered a jagged cut over the eye in the fourth round. It bled profusely and the Spaniard weathered a heavy storm of blows for the rest of the round before getting hasty treatment in his corner.

Apparently discouraged, Gastanaga made only a few defensive gestures in the fifth round before it became apparent his eye was badly affected. Donovan stepped in to halt the proceedings after 46 seconds had elapsed. The referee said afterward the Spaniard's eye was damaged as much by the emergency use of adrenalin as it was by the cut.

Carnera, although obviously rattled by his opponent's unorthodox style, had a decisive margin on points throughout. There were no knockdowns, however, and the crowd of 9,000 onlookers, including 8,834 cash customers who paid \$18,380.08, continually jeered the ponderous Primo's tactics.

CHARLOTTETOWN ROYALS, Island junior hockey champions, returned home last evening in high spirits after holding Chatham Juniors, N. B. titlists, to a well-earned draw in the opening junor of the total-goal series to decide the holders of the two-province crown.

By no means overconfident the local boys nevertheless feel that they will earn the right to oppose the Nova Scotia finalists in the Maritime finals. While expecting stout opposition from a foe that are by no means out of the running, Royals are of the opinion that playing on home ice and with conditions better suited to their style of game they will succeed in eliminating their New Brunswick rivals.

BE THAT AS IT MAY, local fans are sure of witnessing a brilliant, hard-fought tussle when the two teams clash Wednesday evening next. Thursday's game in Chatham was the hardest fought junior game this winter has ever been privileged to witness. Played on ice that would tire the most hardened veteran, the youngsters fought tooth and nail through sixty minutes of rugged hockey that had over 1,200 fans on the verge of hysteria. Under the conditions neither squad could display their best efforts but it was plainly evident that there was very little difference in the strength of the two squads.

CHATHAM ICED a squad that lived up to all advance notices and who are worthy champions of the sister province. They are a fast-skating, tireless crew. Slightly bigger than the Royals, the New Brunswickers play an aggressive type of game from start to finish that proves plenty bothersome to their opponents, and while they stress defence at all times their motto appears to be "a sustained offense is the best defense."

THE EFFORTS OF the team has caught the fancy of the fans also and today Chatham is a hockey town. Everywhere the game is being discussed; and it is all due to the efforts of a determined band of juniors who by their recent successes bid fair to lift Chatham out of the hockey doldrums which it has been in for the past number of years.

THE TEAM IS THE toast of the town, and people of the Miramichi centre, always noted for their hospitality, do everything they can to make visiting teams welcome. Royals will bear this out as on their arrival Thursday evening they received a welcome they will not soon forget.

WITH THE BAND playing a lively tune almost the entire populace greeted the Royals as they stepped off the train. The Mayor of the town then welcomed the boys after which they were taken in cars to the hotel. During the game the players received a great hand and afterwards were guests at an informal banquet. The Chatham team comes to town next week and the Charlottetown sporting public should reciprocate the treatment accorded the Royals and make the visitors' stay an enjoyable one.

BORDEN NATIONALS' defeat last night by Shediac was hardly expected after the Island intermediate champions had pulled an upset by taking the New Brunswick team into camp at Shediac. Nats appeared well on their way to a two-province title but had to bow to a better team on the night's play. They lost nothing in defeat, however, and should feel proud of their efforts, particularly in the playoffs. They were worthy representatives and while congratulations are due to the Shediac team a few bouquets may also be handed the losers on the fine showing they made in this, their first appearance in a Maritime play-down series.

Will Whip Joe Louis Or Retire

BERLIN, March 6.—Looking lean and fit after a winter spent in hunting deer and wild pig on his 15,000 acre game preserve near Muencheberg, Max Schmeling told the Associated Press today he intended to quit the fight game for good if he fails to whip Joe Louis in June.

The former champion, only four pounds over his best fighting weight of 188 pounds despite the fact he has taken only the lightest kind of exercise for several months, expressed the firm conviction he would stop the Brown Bomber. "If I wasn't sure I could beat him and then win the title again," said Schmeling, "I wouldn't have taken this fight. It isn't the money I'm interested in. It is my last chance to win back my title and only Louis stands in the way."

As far as Schmeling is concerned Louis still has to prove he is a great fighter. "He's had the softest time any modern heavyweight ever had," Max declared. "Whom has he beaten? Baer was washed up, scared to death. Carnera was nothing. Levinsky was just a has-been. Retzlaff never could fight much. He won't find me scared."

If Schmeling has thought up any method of fighting Louis after watching the negro knock out Paulino Uzcudun in New York several months ago, he wouldn't disclose it.

"I'll figure that out after we get into the ring," he said with a smile. Schmeling stopped in Berlin for only one day en route to Garmisch-Partenkirchen with his wife, Anny Ondra, who is making a picture calling for some sking.

Max intends to leave for New York about the middle of April and will go immediately to a training camp.

The Prince Edward Island champions remained in the lead until the 14-minute mark when Robidoux drove home a hard shot to tie the count. Less than two minutes later, the snappy front line went through again and this time the count came from the stick of Albert Hebert. It was Albert's second goal of the match. Brother Alyne counted the first goal of the final period.
