IN ALBERTON AND VICINITY

Interesting Items Gathered by the Guardian.

The Sunday School Convention of the Alberton District was held at Alma on Tuesday April 28th. The first session met at 2.30 p. m. and was opened with devotional exercises led by Rev. A. H. Whitman. After a selection by the choir and prayer by Rev. C. Comben, the leader read the first chapter of James, and spoke on the "Doing of the Word." He showed that the chief aim of teaching the Word in the Sunday School should be to build up souls in Christ. After the devotional exercises, the president, Rev. A. D. McDonald, took the chair. The minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted. The roll of Sunday Schools was then called, 11 schools were on the roll and 8 were represented by delegates. Emsdale Presbyterian, Montrose Presbyterian, and Montrose Methodist reported having kept open throughout last winter for the first time. 6 schools are now kept open during the entire year. A Nominating Committee was next appointed. The Field Secretary, Rev. G. P. Raymond, then gave some Echoes from the Denver Convention, at which he was present. He spoke of a few things that had made a great impression upon him. The first was the greatness of the Convention not in respect to numbers, but to the vast extent of the work itself. Sunday School workers were there from Alaska, British Columbia, the Western States and even from P. E. Island. Twenty-five denominations were represented at this convention. He was also impressed with the seriousness of the work, and with the fact that it was carried on, not by clergymen, but by laymen, business men and women. Much time was spent in prayer at the committee meetings, all kneeling and pleading with God for the success of the work, and in the spirit of fellowship all denominations met together as one.

A short address on Sunday School work was given by Mrs. Steele of Alberton. This address showed the great necessity of keeping in close touch with the scholars during the week. The teacher must be well instructed in the Bible and the one thought to have in mind should be the training of the scholars to Christ. Teach them that Christ has come, that he will come again and that it is most important for each and all to be ready for His coming. If a scholar absents himself from the school for a Sunday, hunt him up, or send a note telling him that you missed him.

Then followed an open conference participated in by Rev. H. G. Gratz, Mrs. Steele, Rev. A. D. McDonald, Rev. C. Comben and W. S. Clark. The first session closed with singing by the choir, and the benediction by the Field Secretary.

EVENING SESSION.

The evening session opened at 7.30 p. m. with devotional exercises led by Rev. C. Comben. The president then took the chair. The minutes of the afternoon session were read and adopted. The report of the Nominating Committee was then given, the following officers being nominated:—
Pres.—Rev. H. G. Gratz.
Vice Pres.—W. S. Clark.
Sec'y, Treas.—Miss E. Wilkinson.
Additional members of Executive,—Daniel Gordon, Philip Pridham, William Smith, Joseph Dunbar, Mrs. William McNeill.

It was moved that this report be adopted. An address of welcome to the visiting delegates was delivered by Rev. A. H. Whitman and heartily responded to by Rev. A. D. McDonald.
Rev. H. G. Gratz then gave an address on "The teacher and his Bible"—illustrating his subject by taking a recent Sunday School lesson, and showing how the Bible might be used in connection with it. While the collection was being taken, a very excellent duet was rendered by Mrs. Marchbanks and Miss Carrie Pridham. The Field Secretary then gave his address on "The Holy Spirit." His remarks were very earnest and extremely helpful. The main thought was that all teaching must be applied by the Holy Spirit. As Christ was the representative of the Father, so the Holy Spirit is the representative of Christ. In his closing remarks he referred to the great loss the convention had sustained in the removal from Alberton of Rev. W. J. Howard. After a few remarks by the retiring president Rev. A. D. McDonald, the convention closed with singing "God be with you till we meet again," and the benediction by Rev. C. Comben.

The convention was well attended the church being crowded at both sessions. Mrs. Marchbanks filled the position of organist with marked ability, and her playing was very greatly appreciated by all. It has been decided by the Executive to hold the next convention in the Presbyterian church at Alberton on first Tuesday in November.
