Mrs. Annie Coyle, Charlottetown, has been served with a summons for first offence against the prohibition law.

Miss Ethel McLean who has been spending several weeks in Charlottetown, the guest of Mrs. Donald McKinnon, left yesterday morning for Marble Mountain, C. B., to stay for a time with Mrs. T. A. McLean, Jr.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Bank of New Brunswick, held on the 19th inst., C. H. Eason was appointed General Manager of the Bank in succession to R. B. Keenan, who has resigned. Mr. Eason is one of the foremost and most successful managers of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and is at present in charge of their Winnipeg office.

A Prohibition Case between A. Boisson vs Major McKinnon, Glenadale, came up before Stipendiary Shaw for Queens County, in Charlottetown on Saturday and was dismissed owing to the failure to find the beer seized of sufficient strength. It is understood two other summonses are to be sent out to the country today also that a search warrant has been issued in another case.

Ed. Nicholson, Charlottetown, had a very narrow escape from drowning on Saturday. He, with Frank McDonald, were out in a motor boat on the Hillsboro River and in trying to free the tiller of sea-weed lost his balance and fell overboard. His chum, did not miss him for sometime but when he did promptly turned his boat and with great difficulty succeeded in getting him into the motor, just as help came from the shore.

At the Police Court in Charlottetown this morning the prohibition cases of Jas. McDonald, M. Murphy and Geo. V. Moore were adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning when judgment will be given. A party was fined \$1 or 5 days for riding a bicycle on the sidewalk. The Magistrate commented at length on this subject and instanced the upholders and officers of the law to keep a sharp look out for breakers of this law.

The death of Sister St. Philip music teacher at Rustico Convent which occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital Sunday evening at 7 o'clock, has caused much regret. About ten days ago she was taken ill with appendicitis while attending the retreat at Notre Dame Convent. An operation was performed from the effects of which she never recovered. The sad affair has cast a gloom over the sisters at the Academy. Sister St. Philip was a native of Quebec and was only 20 years of age. Her body was forwarded to Montreal yesterday morning for interment in the cemetery of the Mother House.

Many citizens in Charlottetown will hear with regret that Dr. McLaughlin has decided to locate in Western Canada, where he is at present with Mrs. McLaughlin and Miss Pearl. The Doctor has disposed of his practice and residence on Prince Street to Dr. Ross of Alberton who came to Charlottetown yesterday to locate. Dr. E. J. Kier of Mill River has decided to take over Dr. Ross' practice in Alberton. While regretting the departure of Dr. McLaughlin and family The Guardian heartily welcomes Dr. Ross and family to Charlottetown. Dr. Ross' card will be found elsewhere in this issue.

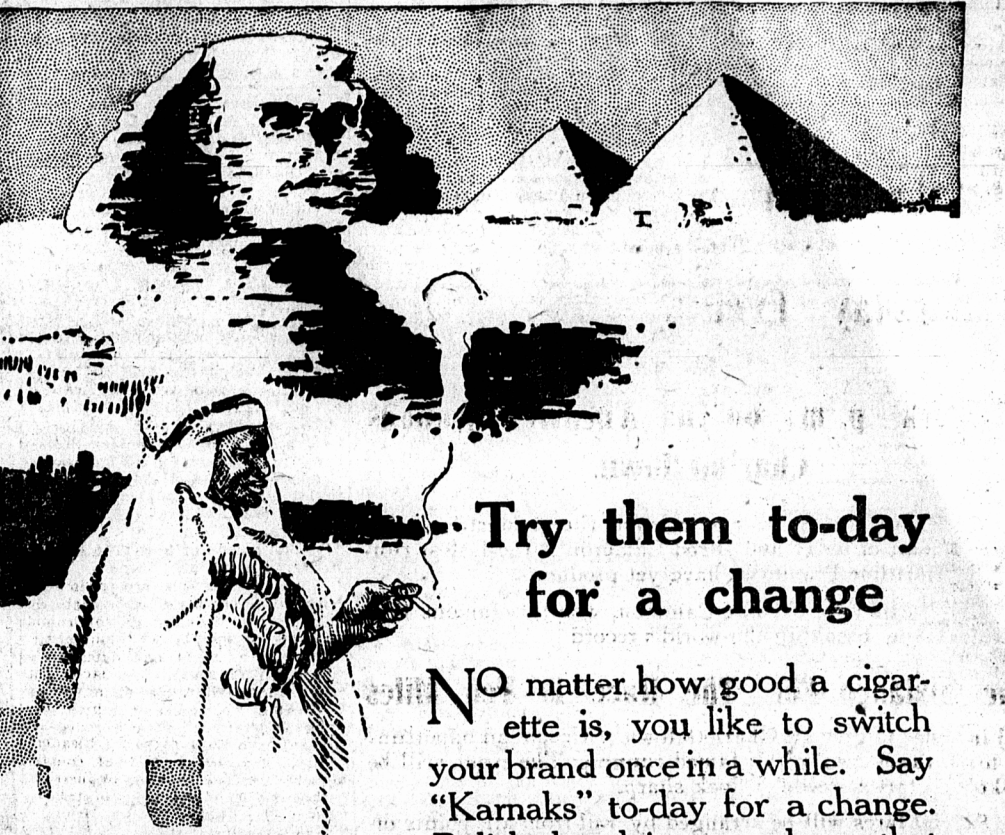
