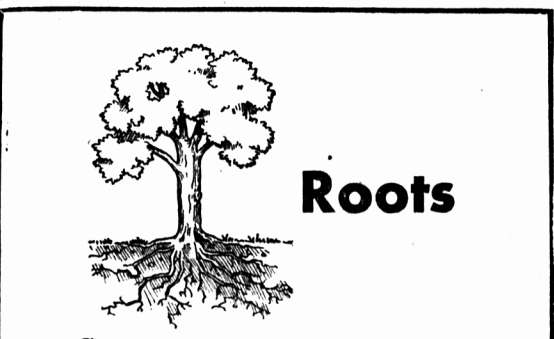

**Safeguard Fisheries as Mustard Gas Dumped**

Getting rid of two or three thousand tons of mustard gas, Dominion authorities dumped recently off the Atlantic coast, but at a spot well away from any fishing grounds and under conditions which made it sure no harm would be done the fisheries. Actually, the dumping took place in the general vicinity of Sable Island but many miles away from the fishing grounds of that area and at a place where the water was far deeper than normal fishing depth.

The gas went out to sea in containers loaded on one of the war-developed landing craft—Landing Ship Tanks is the official designation—which was towed by a couple of tugs and, like the gas, the LST never came back from that voyage. At the appointed spot, lawful scuttlers went to work and in due course the cargo and boat went down, deep, deep sea. As a matter of fact, the LST didn't take kindly to the scuttling and before it would take the downward plunge several rounds of shells had to be fired into it, at the waterline, by an escorting depth-keeper.

Gradually, very gradually, the gas will seep out from its metal containers as they become corroded in time on the ocean floor but the nature of mustard gas is such, the scientific authorities have found that in a large body of water it is rapidly converted into harmless products. Thus, the seepage will do no harm to any fish which may chance to wander from the distant fishing grounds and come sniffing along on exploration bent.

Under the provisional fur seal agreement, made between Canada and the United States after the four-power Pelagic Sealing Treaty ceased to be operative a couple of years or so ago, the Dominion will receive 20 per cent, instead of 15 per cent, of the annual take of seal skins at the Pribilof Islands, which are owned by the United States. With seal skins worth a good many dollars each, a five per cent increase in Canada's share of the pelts means something.
