STYLES IN LONDON

As Described by the Guardian's Correspondent.

The burning question of the day just now is "What will be the climax of this Fashion business? The situation is undoubtedly grave and may prove serious unless France recognizes the advisability of a graceful retreat. Great Britain has done everything to make the retirement easy and dignified, even to the extent of promising M. Marechal to supply him with food and ammunition, so long as the munitions of war were used solely as a means of protection against the attacks of savage tribes and that the retreat were unqualified. Could reasonable consideration consistent with the honor of the country go further? Why then, should the French press endeavour to incite the use of the nation, by its repeated insinuations relative to the fact that England's only object is the humiliation of France? The truth of the matter lies in the necessity for French officials to divert the minds of their compatriots from the Dreyfus case, a subject fraught with even greater misery to the nation and entailing perhaps a second revolution. The retirement of the cabinet is our news of this morning, which will no doubt avert any immediate war action. The opening of our law courts today necessitated services in two separate churches, that of the English Catholic members being held in Westminster Abbey, of the Roman Catholics in a small church in Lincoln-Inn-Fields. The service in the Abbey was most dignified and impressive, the brilliant rays of an unusually bright autumnal sun illuminating every nook and corner of the ancient edifice. The Lord Chancellor in his robes of black and gold, preceded the judges, and with them was received by the Canons in residence, the Attorney General and members of the Bench and Bar following in procession and almost filling the church. The service throughout was strikingly simple, as was also that in the little church of St. Anselm, conducted by Rev. Father Fitzgerald, where the Lord Chief Justice and other Romanist judges were given the crucifix or "Sign of Peace" to kiss. Many ladies accompanied those in attendance, and it was with a difficulty seats were found for all.

In the matter of hats and millinery generally, there is still the apparent effort to introduce the early Victorian era; not quite to the extent of last year, as the ridiculous play "Trelawny of the Wells" at the Court Theatre, Sloan Square, has practically killed by its grotesque and exaggerated representations, any very extravagant productions; still there are many of the broad-brimmed, mushroom shape, trimmed with long drooping feathers, the ends of which are fastened in front, beneath a velvet bow, with the inevitable paste buckle. This style of hat is extremely picturesque, but essentially adapted to a peculiar style of Madonna-like face. For the piquant beauty, the rignon hat is like "The Pickwick, the Owl, and the Waverly Pen. They come as a boon and a blessing to men," or rather to women, and is to be had in velvet, felt or cloth, the same as costume worn with it, which latter is, to my taste, decidedly the most "smart." Many hats have the crown of one color and brim of a contrast, for instance a scarlet crown has a black, blue or fawn brim, grey crown with white and so on; the wide brims are often seen with three or four rows of baby ribbon velvet sewn on the outside. For the ordinary, every-day, common-place style of face, which experience teaches me we fail to meet with in Charlottetown, there is the jaunty little velvet toque, made by many a neat-handed amateur to suit her own peculiar style, but she must be quite sure to have the trimming very wide, if it is in the front, though quite as many are trimmed high on the side. Also she should have the ubiquitous true lover's knot; these, for the benefit of the uninitiated, I may state are very simply constructed, by winding a piece of ribbon velvet, chiffon, or satin, round a piece of wire, which form into the knot, giving two or three little crooks to the larger loops, which removes all stiffness. LEFT TO CONSCIENCE

The Spanish Commissioners Reply and Withdrawal.

LONDON, November 4.—The Paris correspondent of the Times who repudiates as "Calumny" messages of hostility towards the United States contained in letters he has been receiving from Americans for some time, says:

I understand that at to-day's sitting, the Spanish commissioners will reply textually as follows: It is impossible for us to accept or refuse the conditions the United States impose. We do not desire to declare a formal rupture, because it would oblige Europe to run the risk of beholding the humiliating spectacle of an American fleet bombarding European shores. We do not intend to furnish America with a pretext for the realization of such an act; but we cannot subscribe to dictates which are not in conformity with the stipulations adopted in common in the agreement that terminated the war. We withdraw because we do not feel we have a right to sign the abdication sought to be imposed on us. We withdraw leaving public conscience and history to judge the act of violence of which we are the object, and although we are unfortunately convinced that our attitude will have no effect upon the minds of our conquerors, we cannot assume any other, because, by accepting the conditions imposed, we should become accomplices in an injustice and violation of international law, to which we may submit, but in which it is impossible to ask us to take any share of responsibility.

"YOUR MONEY OR YOUR LIFE" Paris, November 4.—The Evening Post says: "Your money or your life" is the attitude taken by America in regard to Spain. The latter, having no money, offers Por. Rico and the abandonment of Cuba, and thinks she has thus discharged their ransom. Pardon me, answers Jonathan, you yet have the Philippine islands, which are only an incumbrance to you. I will relieve you of them. Why? Because, with Fortaine, I have the strongest reasons for so doing.

The Prince Edward Island Sunday School Association.

The Fifth Annual Provincial Convention will be held (D.V.) in the Baptist Church at Charlottetown on Wednesday and Thursday, November 22 and 23, 1898.

Pastors of Churches, Superintendents of Sunday Schools, County and District Presidents, Officers and Executive of the Provincial Association are ex officio members of convention. A Reception Committee will be in attendance at the Baptist Church, and all delegates will report there on their arrival.

It is expected that prominent S.S. workers and ministers will take part, and this Convention will be a good one in every sense of the word. A program will be issued in the press, and notices given from time to time. The expense of calling the Convention and obtaining a deputation makes it necessary for this Association to ask for aid. Kindly ask your school to take up a collection for the Provincial Association, and send the amount with one of your delegates or by letter to the undersigned. Any sum will be thankfully received.
