Reports of additional damage to highway bridges from record high tides Friday night continued to reach the Provincial Highway Department yesterday. Other reports told of damage to a large bridge at Stanley. Here reports, not confirmed officially, said the bridge was impassable when the approach was swept away. Slow Progress Against Drifts

Slow progress was reported yesterday as snow plows completed the third day of struggle against snow drifts which blocked Prince Edward Island roads following the blizzard on Friday. On the road to Summerside the plow had reached a point only a short distance beyond Brookfield, it was said. On the St. Peter's Road slightly better headway was made and the snow was reported beyond Mt. Stewart last night. Work would continue all night. Highway officials said. The road would be opened to Summerside and Borden and to Souris, it was understood. RELIEF FOR FISHERMEN

The Dominion Government has granted \$30,000 to aid needy Prince Edward Island fishermen. Hon. B. W. LePage, president of the executive council of the P. E. I. government, announced yesterday. Hon. Mr. LePage, chairman of the fishermen's loan board, returned Saturday from Ottawa. The \$30,000 grant would be spent, he said, in addition to the \$50,000 received from the Dominion Government for loans to fishermen. Combined with the \$25,000 voted by the Provincial Government for fishermen's relief, a total of \$105,000 would be expended by both governments during the year, he said through the fishermen's loan board. Flour and staple groceries would be distributed with the aid of the \$30,000 grant.

TO OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY

Plans were underway for the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the historic meeting in Charlottetown on September 1, 1884, of the statesmen whose deliberations led to Confederation. Hon. B. W. LePage, president of the executive council of the P. E. I. Government announced yesterday. Hon. Mr. LePage said he would be in Ottawa for the Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Finance, that they "would be glad to recommend that financial assistance be given by the Dominion Government to the Province for this most commendable purpose." A grant was received from the Dominion Government in 1914 towards the celebration of the 30th anniversary of the event. However, owing to the outbreak of the Great War, the festivities were not carried out.
