ATLANTIC SHIPPING.

It was recently announced that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company had purchased fourteen steamships of the Eber-Dempster line and would hereafter engage extensively in the business of trans-Atlantic transportation, as they have for years past shared in the direct traffic across the Pacific between Canada, Australia and Asia. It was moreover given out by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy that the large purchase of ships just now made was but the nucleus of much more extensive fleet to be hereafter acquired. Thus within the brief space of a few years this great railway corporation have not only spanned the continent with the greatest railway system in existence but are reaching out across two oceans west and east to the very ends of the earth and building up a system of world-engirdling transportation such as a past generation had never dreamed of.

This is something more than a great project of a great railway and marine corporation. It is Canada's answer to the Morgan combine of Atlantic shipping. Morgan relied upon the fact that the ocean shipping is absolutely dependent upon railway transport. The railways bring the teeming products of the inland regions to the great seaports. Ships carry these products to distant markets beyond the seas. A great railway combination is thus inevitably able to control the connecting lines of ocean transport. The only possible way to meet the Morgan combine successfully was obviously with a like combination of railway and ocean transport. Only in this way could Canada be saved from being at the mercy of the Morgan combine, and it is to be observed that no other Canadian railway corporation than the C. P. R. was in a position to take up the controversy.

It may be said that the interests of the people and those of powerful transportation companies are seldom identical. It is to be regretted that so many of the great branches of human activity are monopolized by combinations of a few large capitalists. We cannot, however prevent this, although it may be regulated in the public interest. It is obviously better to have the British Canadian commerce on the Atlantic controlled by a Canadian railway company than by the Morgan combine. In the last analysis the Canadian Government and Parliament have paramount control of the Canadian corporation but the Morgan combine is utterly beyond control of either the British or Canadian authorities.

We may pause to enquire what would be the result were the Morgan shipping combine to obtain and keep control of the carrying trade of the Atlantic. In the end it must be that the great volume of import and export trade for the entire continent would be directed to United States ports carried by the Morgan railways on land and by the Morgan ships at sea. Canadian railways, Canadian ports, and Canadian shipping, even Canada herself would be largely at the mercy of an unparalled foe. Foreseeing this the Canadian Pacific

Company has entered the arena to protect its own and Canadian interests, and to hold the carrying trade of the North Atlantic, the trade between Canada and Britain free from the shackles with which it is so sterily threatened. We doubt not that the men of the C. P. R. who have proved themselves able to conduct vast new enterprises with financial success, will be equally fortunate in their latest new departure. Against the convictions of many financiers of repute they built the trans-continental railway and made it one of the most prosperous of the steel highways of the world. Equally successful have been their Pacific steamship service connecting with Australia, China and Japan, their great telegraph service, and their management of the great domain of lands in the Northwest which they acquired in subsidy. In every venture so far the C. P. R. has increased its prestige by unqualified success. This is the guarantee that they will succeed in their last great enterprise of establishing a commercial fleet on the Atlantic, an enterprise in the success of which not only the C. P. R. but the Dominion as well have so large a stake.

Referring to the statement made in the Opera House debate to the effect that the Scott Act has done no good in Georgetown, a valued correspondent in that town writes: "I wish you to note in your paper that the Scott Act has at least reduced the number of drinking places in this town from twelve to three or four, and further you can say that with a vigorous push on the part of the Prosecutor and the enforcement of penalties for second and third offences it would be but a short time until the whole traffic could be stopped."

RAILWAY CLERKS ORGANIZE.

MONTREAL, March 4.—W. H. Cambridge, of Toledo, Ohio, special organizer of the National Railway Clerks' Association, to-night organized the clerks of the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk Railways into a branch of his organization. It is stated that as soon as organization is well established application will be made to the railway for recognition and a wage schedule.

CAMPANIA'S HARD VOYAGE.

NEW YORK, March 1.—The Cunard Liner Campania arrived to-day from Liverpool and Queenstown after a most tempestuous passage of 7 days 9 hours and 22 minutes. From the time of leaving Daunt's Rock up to the time of her arrival she experienced a succession of terrific southwest and northwest gales with violent squalls and mountainous seas.
