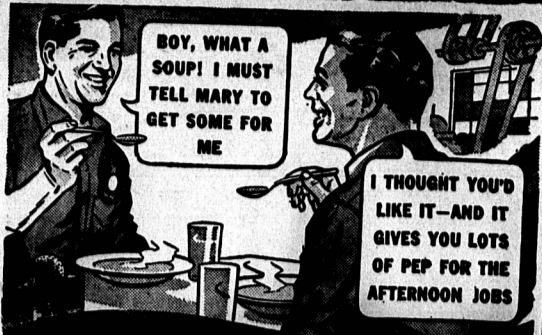
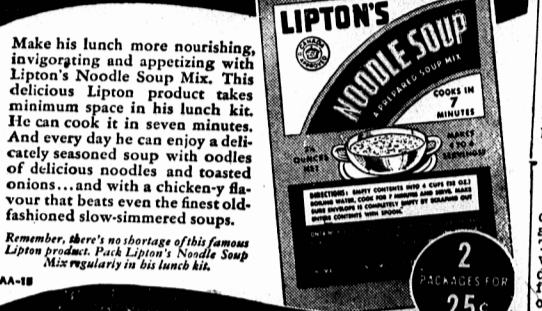

**THE COOK'S CORNER**  
(CHOWCHOW)  
One peck green tomatoes, 5 lbs. cabbage, 6 sweet red peppers, 6 onions, 1 cup salt, 3 pints vinegar, 2 1/2 cup sugar, 1-2 lb. mustard seed, 2 tablespoons celery seed, 1 tablespoon ground horseradish, 1 table-spoon mustard, cabbage, sweet red and green peppers, and onion with the salt and let stand 12 hours. Mix vinegar, sugar, mustard seed, celery seed and horseradish. Bring to boiling point. Add the vegetables. Bring to boiling point and pack into sterilized jars. Seal immediately. This is delicious with cold meats or for flavor and extend meat spread for sandwiches.

**SWEET MUSTARD PICKLES**  
Two quarts small white onions, 2 quarts small or quartered medium sized cucumbers, 2 heads cauliflower, 1-2 cup salt in enough boiling water to cover the cucumbers and onions. 6 sweet green peppers. Let the cucumbers and onions stand in salt water overnight. Drain them in the morning and add the peppers and cauliflower broken into flower-ets, and 1 quart full-strength vinegar and 1 quart water. Cook the vegetables in the vinegar and water for 10 minutes. Then make a paste as follows: mix 2 cups brown sugar, 1 cup flour, 1-4 cup dry mustard, 1 tablespoon turmeric then add 2 cups cold water and stir to make a paste. Stir into the boiling vegetable until thick, then pack in sterilized jars and seal immediately.

**OLD FOLK LIVING WITH THEIR CHILDREN MUST ALTER HABITS**  
Troubles Start When Mother, Dad Realize Younger Generation Does Things Differently

One of the greatest and most insoluble problems in the world is what to do with old people. It is just as often a question of providing spiritual assistance to an old man and woman as it is of giving them food and shelter.

And experience shows that, except in rare instances, when Father or Mother go to live with their children trouble begins, and what had once been a happy home becomes a place of turmoil and squabbling. This is not because the children do not love their parents. Nor is it because the old people do not love their children. It is because the old people are unwilling to provide for their own needs, and their children are unwilling to provide for theirs.

**MENTAL JOINTS STIFFEN IN OLD FOLK**  
It is because with age most men and women let their mental joints stiffen up, as they do their physical joints, and they are not so anxious to do their duty towards them. ## A Job Only You Can Do

Price Control Questions And Answers

**Home Service**  
If You Have Talents, Turn Them to Money

Questions and Answers on Price Control will appear in The Guardian as a regular feature each day. The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives and this column. The answers are provided by the Board Readers. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Q. Do I have to give coupons for baby foods such as strained canned fruit?  
A. Yes, all canned fruits are rationed.

Q. I would like to know if four preserve coupons is the right amount for a two-pound can of syrup.  
A. If you refer to maple syrup you would be required to give two coupons since two pounds is 34 fluid ounces and one coupon is good for 17 fluid ounces. If you refer to corn syrup or any blended syrup two coupons would be necessary since one coupon is valid for the purchase of 14 fluid ounces or one pound.

Q. How does one become identified with the organization of the Consumer Branch of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board?  
A. If you belong to any organized women's group, it is entitled to select a liaison officer to represent you under the Women's Regional Advisory Committee of the Board, which in turn represents the Consumer Branch throughout the Dominion. There are now almost 13,000 of these liaison officers and committee members and the Branch will not be satisfied until every women's group is so associated with its work.

When a farmer purchases a cow he is in effect gambling that one animal against his entire herd, say veterinary authorities, unless before being placed with the other animals the cow has been tested by a veterinarian to ensure that it is not a disease carrier.

The production of seeds of vegetables and field crops in Canada has increased at least five times that of pre-war years. A program of scientific research essential to developing satisfactory control methods of many seed-borne diseases is now in progress.
