Plans Not Completed For Mar. Baseball Finals

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Sept. 28 (CP)—Arrangements for the Maritime senior finals, the tri-province baseball classic, have yet to be settled. The finalists are Saint John Dockmen and Halifax Navy.

A spokesman for dockmen said tonight the club will get in touch with the Halifax team tomorrow and see if details can be arranged for a proposed best of five series.

The hard fighting dockmen include some of the Saint John Ironmen who won the New Brunswick title last year and then lost to Halifax Navy in the Maritime finals.

The present New Brunswick champions have a strong hurling

combination in Doug Ross and Johnny Harvey, each 22 years old. Big Bill Darnery, third baseman, will be available for a turn on the mound.

Catcher Ted Holburn is no novice at swatting the horsehide, and another strong batter is Ray McAllister, centre fielder. Dockmen have Ray Priest at first, "bush" Nickerson on second and "Binks" O'Leary at short. Nickerson came out of retirement a year ago and has been one of the club's most valuable players this season. Other Dockmen include Paul McGrattan, left field, and George Littlejohn, right field.

N. H. L. Swings Into Action on Oct. 30

MONTREAL, Sept. 28 (CP)—Short of many of its stars by an ever tightening manpower situation the National Hockey League swings into its fifth wartime season Saturday, Oct. 30, the date which has been set for publication of the 1943-44 schedule.

Four of the league's six teams will see action opening night, with Boston Bruins at Montreal Canadiens and New York Rangers at Toronto Maple Leafs. The remaining two teams, Detroit Red Wings and Chicago Black Hawks, will get into play the next night, when Rangers move on to Detroit and Maple Leafs to Chicago.

The 4-1-2 month season ends Sunday, March 19, and, as in the 1942-43 season, each team plays 50 games.

The first home game for the Rangers will be Saturday, Nov. 6, when they will be "at home" to the Blackhawks, but Boston fans will have to wait until Tuesday, Nov. 16, before seeing a contest on home ice. That night, Bruins clash with Canadiens.

Once again, Toronto gets a major quota of Saturday night games, with 20 of the 21 Saturdays on the schedule allotted to them. The exception is New Year's night, when they meet the Bruins at Boston while the Canadians play at Chicago.

WITH THE R. C. A. F. SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, Sept. 27 (CP)—One Lancaster squadron in Bomber Command in which a bunch of Canadians are flying has "The Shrine of Saint Cecilia" for a theme song.

Pilot Officer H. S. Short, a pilot from (119 Kent St.) Whitley, Ont., explains it:

"Ever since we started to sing it, as a sort of ritual before every operation, we haven't lost a man in the squadron excepting one night when we forgot to sing it about six weeks ago. Now we never miss playing it on the gramophone every night and morning and we always sing it at breakfast when we get back from a raid."

Incidentally, these fellows say the new Nazi dodge of dropping bombs to illuminate the path the bombers are following into their bombing run is not so hot, it also lights up the path of our own enemy fighters who are more easily visible and gives our bomber gunners a better chance to fend off the aerial target-defenses.

Sgt. Mal Summers of Moose Jaw, Sask., whose parents live in Vancouver, came back from a bombing attack on Mannheim in a report having to bank away from a "rocket" that burst in front of his aircraft as he was preparing to release the bombs. "But don't misunderstand him," "Rocket" is just another way of saying "flak and Mal wasn't speaking of some new German defence effort."
