(Continued from page 5.) brother, and he said he would send me five dollars if they would vote for Fred Heartz. I said I didn't think I could get them. We had no drink, though we went to Mabon's drugstore together and I got a bottle of Fernu, also had a drink of cream soda. I paid for both of the purchases. To the best of my knowledge the liquid I drank was only cream soda. I have had cream sodas at Ferguson's and it was cream soda as far as I know. I told my brothers of Fred McDonald's offer and they said they did not know what they were going to do. (On being closely questioned by Mr. Morson, he admitted having asked his brothers to vote for Heartz.) I received no money from Fred McDonald, nor did I receive any whiskey from Mabon.

No one got any reward for voting Liberal to my knowledge and I myself received nothing. I did not ask the L. McDonald for any loan, though I did request Arthur McQuaid to lend me money. He would not give it to me, however. I did not promise to vote for anyone. I simply said to him that I would help the man, who would help me out, when I could.

Cross examined by Mr. Johnston: F. McDonald, only asked me if my brothers would take five dollars to vote. No offer was made and I did not tell my brothers that such was the case. No conversation with Mr. McDonald influenced me politically in anyway.

Albenus Francis McDonald was called and examined by Mr. Mathieson. The examination was delayed for some little time during the discussion on a point of technicality, but the evidence was eventually admitted as follows: I voted at the last provincial election for L. McDonald and F. Heartz. I am a property holder. I cannot tell the definite value of my land. No one tried to induce me to sell my vote. There was a slight discussion at the poll on the day of the election regarding my right to vote and when it was suggested that I should be sworn, I at once took the oath.

property his evidence closed.

The next witness, Omar Paquet, was called by Mr. Mathieson. He gave evidence as follows:

I am a barber, F. S. McDonald owns the shop I occupied during the last election. I know Mr. Mabon the druggist very well, also F. S. McDonald. He was working for the Liberals during the last election. I did not work in the shop during the election for two days, the rest of the time I was frequently in Mabon's shop with F. S. McDonald, between the 16th October and 18th November. I never saw liquor distributed when F. S. McDonald was there. At other times I have seen liquor sold. I do not know how much. I have got liquor there myself without paying for it. It was given to me for no purpose. I took no interest in the election. I voted for F. Heartz and L. McDonald. I drove once with F. McDonald during the election. I had liquor with me, but it was for myself. Mabon gave it to me. I got liquor twice or more on the day before election. I drank all the liquor I bought myself. I gave no liquor to any person during election. I had no liquor in the building (where I work) for anyone. L. McDonald was in my store once or twice during the campaign.

Witness was then asked if he had seen a number of persons entering Mabon's Drugstore, but denied doing so. Regarding the amount of liquor being distributed from Mabon's store, he stated that he had no idea except what he had taken there himself. According to his story all the liquor he had was in his house the night before the election. He took a bottle of whiskey out with him that night and he and Mabon had a game of cards with three young men. They also had a drink but he was not sure if the young men took anything. He did not remember anything very clearly regarding the evening of election day.

To quote his own statement "I was pretty full." In concluding his evidence the witness stated he had received no liquor from F. McDonald on election day. After a brief cross examination by Mr. Johnson the witness was dismissed.

D. Kicham of Souris west, who was examined by Mr. Mathieson, stated as follows:

I voted for Heartz and McDonald. Did a little canvassing for them and attended meetings. I distributed no money or liquor for election purposes. I have liquor of my own and I sometimes treat my friends. I did this once or twice during election time, but told them particularly that it was not to influence their voting. I received no fund, or gave no fund to promote the election of Heartz and McDonald. I don't think I gave liquor to any one on election day. I saw L. McDonald during election time also J. P. Kelley. I don't remember treating him to any liquor. The witness frankly admitted that he some times sold liquor, stating that he had never had on had would be 8 to 10 gallons. Most of that was gone when the election took place. When it ended he only had about four gallons. He had heard that Fred McDonald was distributing liquor, but that was all. He was then asked by Mr. Morson regarding further treating, but denied any definite knowledge.

When cross examined by Mr. Johnson the witness stated that whiskey could never have any influence on his vote. He was then dismissed.

E. Kennedy the last witness, being called by Mr. Mathieson stated that he also had been given a package by F. McDonald which he thought contained \$15. He did not open it and returned it some days after the election not having used the money in any way. The court adjourned till tomorrow morning.
