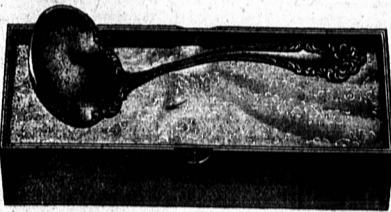

Times in the upper part of Prince Edward Island are slowly but steadily improving says a correspondent to the Maritime Farmer. People are living better and have more money to spend. Time was when nothing would bring cash but oats, but nowadays farmers can get cash for everything they sell. A very important factor has been the introduction of these factories, which are flourishing.

It will have been noticed by Guardian readers that the French cruiser Kleber recently landed troops in connection with the trouble in Morocco. The Kleber is the war vessel that was in this harbor for several days last summer. It will be remembered that the cruiser carried a first class band and that many citizens had the pleasure of listening to its splendid music each evening during the ships' stay in port.

The joint installation of the officers of the three City Courts, I.O.F. will take place in Castle Hall tonight at eight o'clock. A special program has been prepared for the occasion, which will include vocal and instrumental music together with recitations by the best talent of the City. The committee in charge have spared no pains to make the evening enjoyable and every member of the several courts is specially invited to attend. Refreshments are to be served after the program.

Woodstock, N. B. has a weather prophet who predicts that the last part of the winter will be mild like the first. He predicts a general spring break up about the second week in March, and the ice will run out of the St. John river before April 1st. By that time the snow will be gone and conditions will be such that farmers will be able to plough and sow by the middle of April. But nothing will be done so doing as the latter half of the month and the whole of May will be cold and backward.

There is a locally says the Maritime Merchants, Halifax, a moderate demand for all kinds of provisions. A few orders are reported for vessel outfitting supplies, but the general trade in beef and pork has been much smaller than usual this winter owing to the quietness of the lumber industry. Beef seems now to be fairly steady in primary markets; it went off 25c, some weeks ago, but is now quite steady. Pork is just a little weaker. The third of the Saturday series of papers on music was, as briefly referred to in yesterday's Guardian, given on Saturday. These papers (or musicals as they really are) are open not only to the students of the Charlottetown School of Music but to the general public. The bill of fare is interesting and edifying both to ears and intelligence. One or more of the schools' students give the instrumental numbers. The director, Professor Watts, gives analytical notes on the pieces played or sung, also contributes a paper on one of the composers or on subjects of general musical interest. Students are supposed to attend with note books as the director notes on the black board technical terms and asks that these be copied. A vocalist is asked to assist so a program of variety and value is one's for the trouble of attending. The pianist of the afternoon was Miss Fanny Gill. Her numbers were (a) Allegretto, "La Fontaine" by Bohm; (b) Lullaby from Jocelyn; (c) Chopin's sharp minor waltz. Chopin, she possesses a good touch, phrases nicely and aims at interpreting her works. For one so young the C. sharp minor waltz might have been thought a trifle ambitious. She was equal to its harmonic demands no less than to the exacting fluency the Piu Vivo movement requires. The Lullaby demonstrated her ability to grasp and delineate all that is meant by cantabile while the Fountain by Bohm afforded opportunity for dainty phrasing. The vocal numbers were contributed by Mrs. C. S. Moore. Mrs. Moore was in excellent voice. Sang the florid waltz song by Ardit with a verve and tempo that were exhilarating. Most sympathetically given were the two ballads "I'm wearin' awa' by Foote and Coombe's "Four Leaf Clover." Interesting notes were read anterior to each piece. The paper on Music as a Recreation, as Medicine, as a Moral Force, was excellently written. Mr. Watts has a facile pen, his style is the florid (this is taking notes) or Bravura order, that too is a characteristic of his Art. The musical public has a great opportunity in these Saturday musicals.

A sad accident occurred yesterday by which Frederick Nicholson of Murray River was burned to death. The accident was discovered by some children who noticed smoke coming out of the door. They quickly gave the alarm to the neighbors but Mr. Nicholson was so badly burned that he died about two hours after. The whole community is deeply grieved at the unfortunate man's sad death.
