HALIFAX WINS WAY INTO FINALS BIG FOUR

Wolves Squeeze Out 4-3 Victory In Deciding Game

Great Uphill Battle Of Abbies Falls Short In Third Period After Winners Score Four Counters In Middle Session.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, N. S., March 5.—Charlottetown Abbeys' gallant drive for a berth in the Maritime Hockey League's final round failed tonight as they went down to a 4-3 defeat before the smoothly-working Halifax Wolverines after staging a game uphill battle through three encounters.

By their close victory Wolverines wrested from the third-place team the right to meet the league-leading Moncton Hawks in the finals for the league title, and moved a step closer to the play-offs for the Allan Cup which the Hawks brought to the Maritimes last winter.

Tonight's game was the deciding match in a two-out-of-three series. Charlottetown flung four forwards down the ice all the way through the period, and at times five men tried to batter down the home defence. They became dangerous when the Abbies were not ready to meet them.

At 13 minutes mark the five-man attack sailed down the ice; Jackie Kane slipped a pass to Nicholson, and an instant later the puck away from the Abbies. The final score was Sunshine Sisters 4; Superior Sisters 0; Royals 2; Superiors 3.

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Bonthron Comes From Behind

(By Foster Halley Associated Press Sports Writer by Guardian's Special Wire) MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, March 5.—Princeton's great runner Bill Bonthron, far back in the pack for most of the distance, came with a rush in the final lap tonight to win the intercollegiate indoor 1,500-metre title by two metres in a driving finish with Gene Venzke, Pennsylvania sophomore.

Loping along as though just up for a practice warm up through most of the race, with Venzke trailing the pace far out in front, Bonthron turned on the heat in the final two laps to catch the Pennsylvania and break the tape in the un-impressive time of three minutes 57.4 seconds, 4.2-8th seconds behind the world record set by Glen Cunningham of Kansas in defeating the Princetonian in the United States championships Feb. 24.

The United States Intercollegiate Indoor Track and Field Championships got away to a record-breaking start before a capacity crowd of 14,900 tonight. Old marks fell in the first two events to be completed.

William H. N. Block of Bowdoin won the 16-pound shot put with a heave of 46 feet 10 inches, a foot and two inches beyond the old mark set by Dave Adelman, then of Georgetown in 1928. In the afternoon Henry Dreyer of Rhode Island State set a new meet and collegiate mark in the 58-pound weight throw with a toss of 63 feet 2 1-4 inches. This displaced the meet mark of 54 feet nine inches set by Fred Stietner of Pennsylvania in 1931.

The record-breaking continued in the high jump as George Spitz, of New York University, leaped over the bar at six feet 5-8 inches, not an unusual jump for him but 3-4 of an inch above the meet mark set by Leroy Brown of Dartmouth in 1932.

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CONACHER CONCEDED HONORS

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 5.—Any doubt as to who would lead the National Hockey League scorers this season just about disappeared during the week end when Charley Conacher scored three goals and an assist and boosted his leadership over the field to a clear nine points.

The Toronto Maple Leaf right winger is conceded scoring leadership both in points and in actual goals. With the end of the season in sight none seemed to have an outside chance of matching his 31 goals while his total points, 50 were nine more than his centreman, Joe Primeau, second in the whole league.

Statistics issued tonight by President Frank Calder showed Marty Barry, centre of the lowly Bruins, second in the league in goals scored with 22.

The penalty leadership remained unchanged, Red Horner's 129 minutes topping the pack while Lionel Conacher was second with 69.

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Bearcats Capture Opener
