**Commercial Failures in Canada**

Q. What is the record of commercial failures in Canada?  
 A. Commercial failures in Canada are steadily decreasing. The number in 1926 was 1,771, or only half of the number in 1923. Of the 1,771 failures in 1926, 805 were in trade, 389 in manufactures, and 135 in agriculture. The liabilities have decreased in proportion, again only half of what they were four years ago. This improved condition is an evidence of a healthier trade and commerce.

**In Memoriam**

**THE LATE MRS. J. J. DAVIES**

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital Thursday afternoon of Helen Logan aged 87, widow of the late J. J. Davies, the well known hotel proprietor, and Mrs. Davies who had been in failing health during the past year took a paralytic stroke on Tuesday from which she never rallied. The late Mrs. Davies was a native of Pictou. About 50 years ago she and her husband came to Charlottetown where they opened the Rankin House, and later the Davies, now the "Victoria." Two years before they sold out to Mr. Docherty they had acquired the Cliff Hotel, and ran the two, the latter in the summer months. After disposing of the Davies they opened up the "Plaza," first at the corner of Prince and Water Street, now the Lennox Hotel, later on Dorchester Street, and on Prince Street, in the building now known as the Russ Hotel. Subsequently they purchased the City Hotel which they renamed The Davies, disposing of that property in 1924, when they removed to the Cliff Hotel, which they had been conducting as a summer hotel every year since they first took possession of it. After the death of Mr. Davies in 1926 the Cliff Hotel was under the management of his daughter-in-law though Mrs. Davies, despite her advanced years continued to take an interest in the culinary department. This summer, however, her health proved unequal to the task, and for the first time in many years, the hotel was closed. Coming as they did in contact with the travelling public, Mr. and Mrs. Davies became widely known throughout the Maritime Provinces.

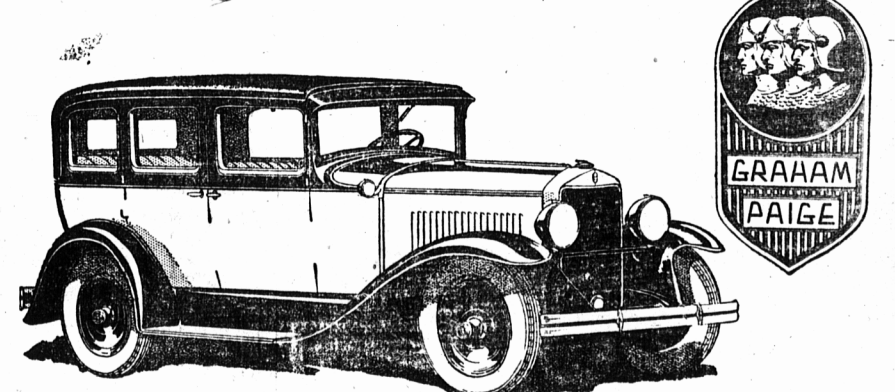

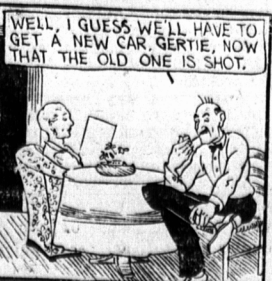
