of Quebec. But for the hostility of prohibition shown by that Province at the Dominion plebiscite in 1898, when all other Provinces gave majorities in its favor a law prohibiting the manufacture, transportation and sale of liquor would have followed that plebiscite ten years before the war. The necessity for provincial prohibitory laws grows out of the impossibility of getting a federal statute that will cover the entire Dominion. Provincial prohibition is a much less powerful and effective remedy for the liquor evil than national prohibition such as was years ago adopted in the United States. It is not a perfect remedy and has not accomplished all that its advocates hoped for, but it is the best available remedy we know of.

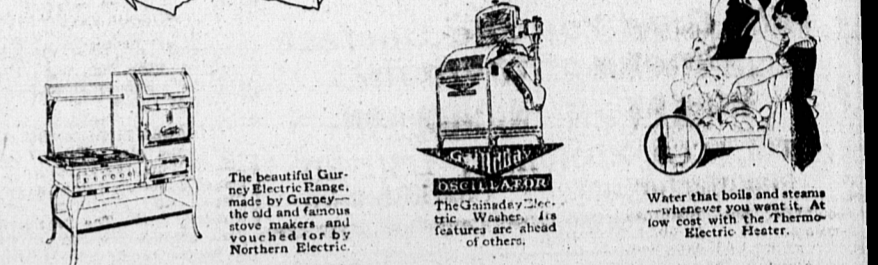
There have been fierce controversies between opposing parties in many countries, states and Provinces over prohibition. Prohibitory laws have been violated more than most other laws, because of the widespread prevalence of the appetite for intoxicants and the profits that could be made in catering to the demand. Prohibitory laws have failed of much of the good they would otherwise have effected because of the opposition encountered and the many violations that have occurred. But despite these serious drawbacks we believe there is a consensus of the best opinion in this and in other Provinces that prohibition has accomplished great good in the land. 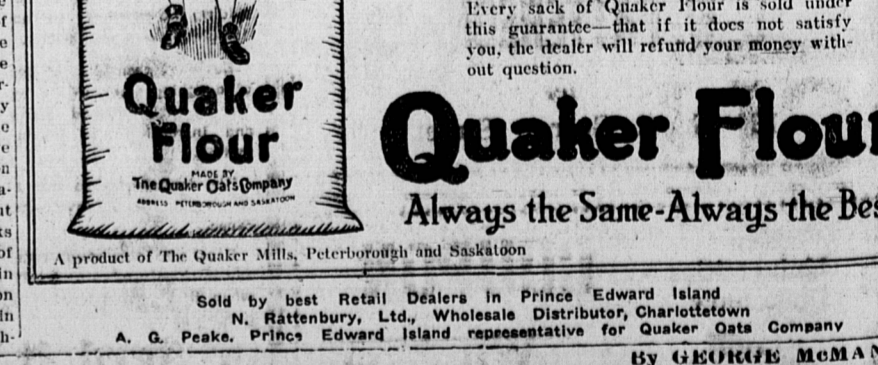

Shearer of Toronto, well known to many in this Province as general secretary of the Social Service Council of Canada in his annual report to that body stated the estimated number of drug addicts in the different Provinces as follows: Quebec 2,250; British Columbia 2,250; Ontario 1,800; Nova Scotia 300; New Brunswick 250; Prince Edward Island, none; Manitoba 500; Saskatchewan 250; Alberta 350. The estimate is made in round figures. Absolute accuracy would be very difficult to ascertain, but a leading Montreal journal accepts them as approximately correct.
