R. NICHOLAS COLWILL

The community of Kingston has sustained a severe loss in the passing of the late R. Nicholas Colwill, which occurred on July 22nd, 1929, at the age of 78 years. He was a son of the late Charles Colwill who came to this country when a young man from Devonshire, England. The deceased spent his life in the community in which he was born and in the long span of service he had been privileged to share, he won his way to a position of leadership. Having shared good health to within a short time before the last, he had always been able to take an active part in every phase of life which he shared. He was a loyal follower of the faith of the Methodist Church and later of the United Church, always deeply interested in all church activities and for over half a century was a reader of "The Wesleyan" and a trustee of the church.

In the community life he held the position of a magistrate for 24 years. He was a trustee of the local hall here. But his activity in connection with veterinary work was especially valued. His readiness at all times and hours to respond to help a neighbor, giving of his experiences not to receive, will long be remembered. He was a loyal supporter of the Orange Lodge and in recognition of what his help and influence meant to that society his brother members recently made him an honorary member. No place probably did he fulfil his task more acceptably than in the home circle, where he led not in the way of harshness but in kindness, his family testifying to the spirit of good will that had always prevailed.

Another humble follower of the Master has been called to stand face to face and there is left to mourn the separation, besides a sorrowing wife, one daughter Mrs. Geo. Green, Kingston, three sons, Septimus H., of New Haven, William W., of Kingston and John H. Elmwood, nine grandchildren, together with four brothers, Rev. S. E. Colwill, Winnipeg, Rev. Samuel F. of Taunton, Mass., Daniel F. and John R. both of Seattle, Washington, one half brother William P., of Alberta and two sisters, Mrs. James Brown, Michigan and Mrs. Everett Ball, Alberta. The funeral service was conducted by his pastor Rev. E. M. Aitken, assisted by Rev. H. Pierce, a former minister and Rev. Mr. Purdy, a close friend of the family. After the service at the home of the deceased a large number of mourners followed in the procession to the Kingston Cemetery where the interment took place. 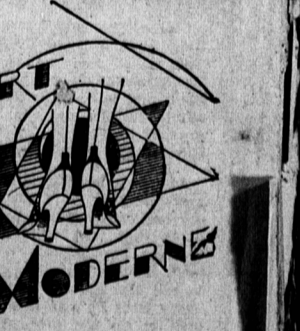

# Snowden Indifferent To Friend Or Critic

British Chancellor Probably Most Thorough Socialist In Present Ministry—Teetotaler But Smokes Innumerable Cigarettes.

(Canadian Press)  
TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 28.—A very human picture of Rt. Hon. Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the British Exchequer is furnished in an article by J. V. McAree in the Mail and Empire.  
"An English contributor to the New York Nation says that not since the days of Pitt has any British statesman had behind him such a unanimous nation as Philip Snowden. This would seem to be about the limit of praise, and one of the most extraordinary things that has happened in political history. Perhaps there was never a man in public life more indifferent to the acclaim of the people and more accustomed to the attacks and jeers of his opponents than the present British Chancellor of the Exchequer.  
"His wife has described him in Carlyle's phrase, 'The Sea Green Incorruptible,' and the less corruptible he is the more formidable and dangerous must he appear to all who stand for the existing order of things. For Mr. Snowden is opposed to it all. He is not an anarchist but we have no doubt that if he had the opportunity he would have the will to shatter the present British political, social and economic universe to bits and remould it nearer to his heart's desire. He is being credited with having the finest intellect in the Labor party, and he is probably the most thoroughgoing Socialist in the present ministry. He has also, and by common consent of his critics, a remarkable gift for finance and economics. Indeed Kathleen Woodward, writing in the New York Times magazine from London, says that he excels any chancellor of the exchequer since Gladstone and we have no doubt, she is merely quoting what some competent critics have said. We can well remember the ovation which the House of Commons gave Mr. Snowden when he made his first budget speech in the first MacDonald government. This may, of course, have been as much a tribute to the personality of the man as to the wisdom of his proposals.  
"The tragedy in Mr. Snowden's life, while it has signally failed to make him tender to others, has softened political asperities in his favor. He is a cripple, a bloodless little man who hobbles about on two sticks. He has been like that since he was a youth when a bicycle accident broke his bones and twisted his frame so that he lay on his back for twelve months and never recovered his health. In his convalescence he read every book on socialism and political economy which he could lay

hands on, and when he rose from his sick bed he was as staunch a socialist as any man in England. His faith in the theory has increased with his years and there has increased also his ability to put in force, often venomous, speech the thoughts that arise in his none too charitable mind. He never indulges in personalities, but he has the gift of making his victims writhe. No man is more courageous. No man is more willing to stand alone for a principle. It cost him not a tremor, we believe, when he uttered his famous ultimatum at The Hague, and when he was denounced in one French paper as the kind of Englishman who had burned Joan of Arc he would receive the insult as a man gently disclaiming a compliment.  
"Mr. Snowden's people are believed to have been Yorkshire weavers, and there is at least no doubt about the Yorkshire birth and descent of Mr. Snowden. He had an elementary school education and then became a clerk in the Inland Revenue Excise department. After his health had been in some measure restored he became a Socialist propagandist, and in 1904 was elected chairman of the Independent Labor Party. The first of his political successes and one of the most memorable of them was his election in Blackburn, a Tory stronghold, in 1906. This he achieved without money and with little support. Naturally he was a pro-Boer and this was one of the disabilities he had to overcome though he never sought to do so by apologizing. Like most other leaders of the Labor party he was against the World War and suffered ostracism and contumely as a result. He is a pacifist and internationalist, although we dare say that it would be impossible to find one man who heard him at The Hague who believes it. There Snowden spoke more in the vein of Lord Palmerston.  
"Those who are intimates of his say that at home in his library he is one of the most charming of men. But since this is always said of people who comport themselves in public like bears, tigers or porcupines we are not wholly convinced. But there is no question that in Mrs. Snowden, a woman of intellectual distinction, he has one of the most popular hostesses in the ranks of the
