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OPERATIONS AT THE DARDANELLES

British Troops Drive Turks From Trenches. The Fifty-second Division Attacked Enemy and Captured 280 Yards of Trenches. Fourteen Inch Guns From Monitors Helped in the Attack.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The British army at the Dardanelles has resumed the offensive and captured 280 yards of Turkish trenches.

"Simultaneously with the assault, our artillery opened on the enemy's reserve support trenches and two 14-inch monitors and H. M. S. Edgar (cruiser), co-operating, and maintained their fire until the position was reported consolidated at about six p.m.

THE GREKO-BALKAN SITUATION STILL THE ABSORBING TOPIC

No Definite Information Yet Available but More Optimistic Feeling Prevails. Position of Serbian Army is Uncertain while Bulgarians are Steadily Advancing.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Nov. 19.—The position of the Serbian army and the attitude of Greece toward the Entente Powers are still outstanding questions of interest in Europe.

The Italians are still hammering away at the Austrian positions on the Isonzo and gaining a little day by day. They have not captured Gorizia, which has been under shell fire for several days.

PARIS, Nov. 19.—The Saloniki despatch announcing the general retreat of the Serbs on the southern front, after the capture of Babuna Pass by the Bulgarians, is without official confirmation.

AUSTRIA'S ACTION IS NOT SATISFACTORY TO THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—While the United States will wait for the Austrian reply to Ambassador Penfield's inquiry concerning the circumstances under which the Italian liner was sunk, it was stated officially to-day that the placing of American citizens in small boats on the high seas was not regarded as according them "a place of safety" within the meaning of the term, as used in international law.

GERMAN WHO BROKE HIS PAROLE IS CAPTURED IN NORTH SEA

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Lieutenant Henry Koch, one of the officers of the interned German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, who violated his parole and left Norfolk in the middle of October, has been taken off a Danish steamer in the North Sea by the British naval authorities.
