At the Bible Dedication Service held last evening in the Canadian National Hotel under the auspices of the Gideon Society, 120 Bibles were presented to the hotel management, one to be placed in each room. The presentation was made by Rev. H. D. Raymond, Rev. E. H. Ramsay offered the prayer of dedication. An address, "Who are the Gideons?" was delivered by Mr. W. J. Green, Canadian Gideon Secretary. OTTAWA, Ont., May 11—The appeal of Jane Lidstone, of West Cape, P. E. I., from a judgment of the Supreme Court of P. E. I., upholding the will of Alfred McWilliams was dismissed by the Supreme Court of Canada today. Miss Lidstone alleged undue influence was exercised over the testator, who was her uncle, by William Nelson McWilliams, and Dr. James B. Champion, the defendants in the case. The trial judge set aside the will, but the Supreme Court of the Province restored it and this judgment was confirmed by the Supreme Court of Canada today. It was argued that Miss Lidstone was the "favorite niece" and that had certain correspondence not been interrupted, she would have shared in the estate.

"We, the Coroners Jury empaneled to inquire into the death of Harold Stewart of Charlottetown, P. E. I. find that the said Harold Stewart came to his death by jumping from Hillsborough Bridge into the river and drowning while temporarily of an unsound mind." The above was the verdict brought in by the Coroners Jury empaneled to inquire into the death of Harold Stewart before Coroner Dr. J. C. Houston, yesterday.

The Jurymen were: B. W. LePage, (foreman), Wm. Cotton, Patrick McTague, J. P. Gordon, W. L. Bruce, W. M. Brown, P. P. McCloskey. The witnesses examined were Dr. I. J. Yeo, Dr. R. J. Ledwell, Dr. G. F. Dewar, Messrs William Brown Walter Mutch, Michael Thomas, and W. L. Higgins.

Wm. Brown, 12 Pleasant St., testified that he knew Harold Stewart, the deceased, who called for him at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, and asked him to go with him in the car to Perley Mutch's, Southport. On arrival there they found that Mr. Mutch was at his ranch, and set out on return. While crossing the bridge Harold stated that he thought they had a flat tire. Both got out and examined the tires, but all were intact. He asked witness to get into car, but he refused to do so. Harold got in, and as witness went around behind the car, the deceased leaped out and plunged over the railing. Witness did not have an opportunity to prevent the action. The deceased struck the water on his back, and remained motionless floating, gazing straight upward. Presently he turned over on his face and floated toward the harbour. Witness shouted to an Indian coming across the bridge. The latter hastened to a dory, and picked up the deceased. When witness first saw the deceased his face was flushed, and his eyes looked wild. He stated during the drive that he wished that he had "skipped out" on Saturday. As the man jumped over he said something like "Here goes." The suspicions of the witness were aroused when he saw that the tires were all right. The deceased appeared to be quite sober.

ALBERTON, May 12—The Liberal-Conservative convention held in Alberton yesterday for the purpose of nominating two candidates to be the standard bearers for the First District of Prince County in the coming provincial election, was a most enthusiastic one. In spite of the wet day ninety two out of a possible ninety five delegates were present and an optimistic spirit prevailed. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Charles D. Dunn of Elmsdale, Vice President of West Prince Conservative Association. Mr. W. Russell Rogers was appointed secretary. There were several candidates.
