RUNCORN - MCKENNA BOUT AROUSING MUCH INTEREST

As far as can be ascertained McKenna is ruling a slight favorite over the champion, however, Runcorn, who is scheduled to arrive here from Moose Jaw, Sask. on or about the 28th, when he will start light training, may enter the ring on even bets with Prince Edward Island's two-listed fighter, Jack McKenna. At any rate it will be a rugged and clever champion against one of Canada's greatest and logical contenders for the coveted crown.

After many months of waiting, "C" Jack is now making his home in North Sydney, Cape Breton, has at last succeeded in fighting his way to the top of the heap and a match with the title holder. It is a golden opportunity and no doubt realized by McKenna to such an extent that Runcorn who has been knocking them all over of late will meet the hardest hitting and shiftest middleweight that has ever

climbed into a ring in this broad Dominion. It is needless to say that on the night of November 4th the Arena Rink, scene of this much talked of championship bout, with a seating capacity of nearly four thousand will be packed to the rafters with a cheering, excited and expectant assemblage. Men in all walks of life and ladies too will grace the balconies and ringside; it will be a gala night—and one long to be remembered, more so if Jack McKenna succeeds in clinching the title he has had his eye on for a long, long time.

McKenna with his sparring partners and manager Alie Lewis will arrive here to begin light workouts the 29th of this month.

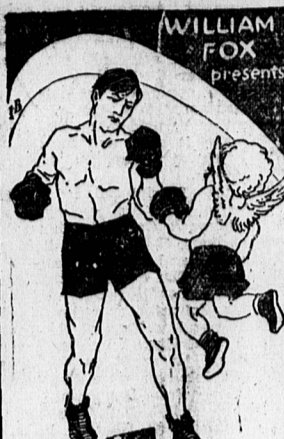

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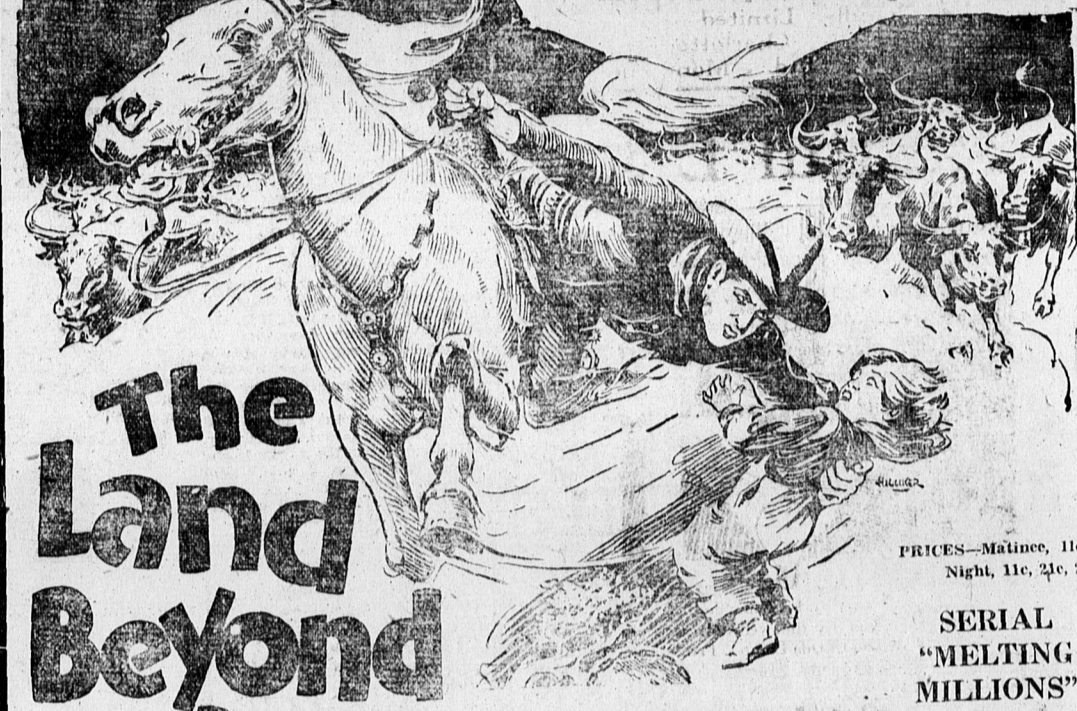

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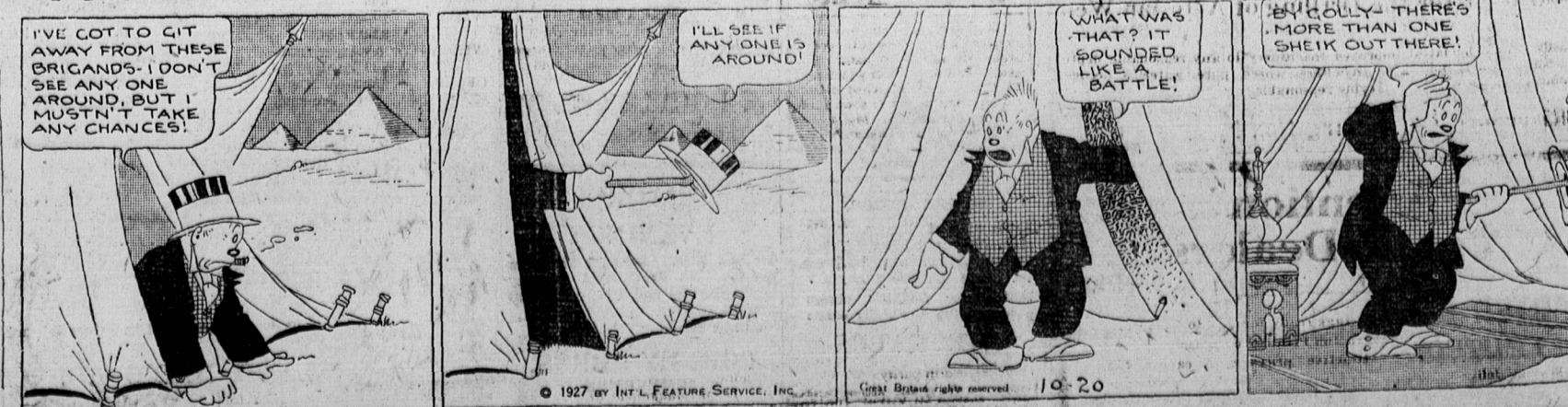
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Bringing Up Father
