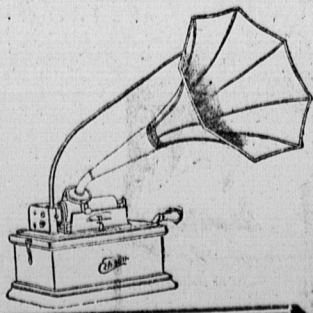

The building will be a large one, having a frontage on Main Street of 80 feet and 12 feet on the side street, or Highland Avenue. The seating capacity of the church will be about nine hundred. Joining the church to the Sunday School rooms will be arranged which together with the main church auditorium will accommodate an audience of about 1500 persons. The building will cost in the vicinity of \$40,000 and will be built of brick and stone, with slate roof.

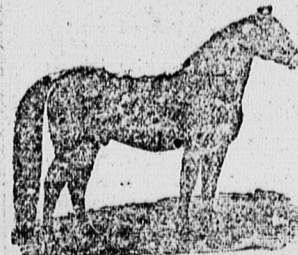
