Residence Is Gift Of Lady Beaverbrook

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 8.—One of the last acts in the life of Lady Beaverbrook, who died in London Thursday, was to join with her husband in a bequest to Dr. Murray MacLaren, M.P., Mr. Justice Crockett, and Dr. Fred R. Taylor, authorizing the erection at the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, of a residence building for the accommodation of 50 students.

The bequest was received by Dr. MacLaren Thursday. He replied in a short time later learned of the death of Lady Beaverbrook.

The following is the bequest: LONDON, Nov. 30.—To Dr. Murray MacLaren, M.P., Mr. Justice Crockett and Dr. F. Taylor: We authorize you to build on our behalf on a university site at Fredericton, a residence suitable for the accommodation of fifty students. The architectural plans should be submitted to competition, confined to Canadians with a preference shown towards young and unknown men. We hope the building will be either stone or brick, but not a mixture of both.

(Signed) GLADYS BEAVERBROOK.

Million And Half Expended On Navy

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—The grand total of Canada's naval service expenditures for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1927, amounted to \$1,597,406.51 according to the annual report of the National Defence Department just issued here. Of this \$1,500,000, over one-third was consumed by the barracks at Halifax and Esquimaux, the former accounting for \$266,005.17, and the latter for \$259,431.93. The maintenance of the two destroyers, Patriot and Patrician, cost the country over \$250,000, the exact figures being \$199,219.89 for Patriot and \$167,574.39 for Patrician. The four minesweepers, Festubert, Ypres, Armentieres and Thiepval, accounted for \$167,744.86 of the annual expenditures.

The strength of the Royal Canadian Navy is 70 officers and 446 men, that of the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve 70 officers and 430 men and of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve 70 officers and 830 men. Twenty officers of the R.C.N. are serving in the Royal Navy, the report shows.

Coldest Place In Whole World

(By British United Press.) LONDON, December 8.—What is believed to be the coldest place in the world has been discovered in north east Siberia. This is revealed in an article which the explorer, Sergei Obruchev, a member of the Russia Geological Survey, has written to the Geographical Journal.

The expedition discovered nine chains of mountains, the existence of which was unsuspected. New maps of the world will have to take note of this great range, which is certainly over 600, and may be 1,000 miles long and nearly 200 miles wide, and covers an area greater than the chain of the Caucasus.

These snow-capped mountains reach a height of more than 10,000 feet, and are probably the last on the globe that remained to be discovered. They have been named the Cherski range in honour of the great Russian geologist who died in 1892 while attempting the exploration of the region.

In this wild country, which took nearly five months to traverse, the expedition came across a tribe of hunters, the Tungus, the remnants of the race. There were no more than about one for every 400 square miles. They also explored the head waters of the Indigirka, a river which flows into the Arctic Ocean. Here they found the river to be a mountain torrent, in places two and a half miles wide. Through one gorge, with cataract after cataract, it wound tortuously for over 60 miles, with an almost incredible beauty.

In November, the temperature fell as low as 60 degrees Cent. below zero. This was at Oimekon, and at these low temperatures at such an early date led the expedition to suppose that there is probably the coldest place on earth.

To determine this point, further explorations are to be made in winter, when it is expected also that the Cherski range will be found to extend a further 300 miles than has been noted.

BRITISH BACON UP, WILL HOGS FOLLOW?

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—Judging from the British market cables, it would appear that the improvement in the hog situation predicted by Canadian packers recently is about to be realized. For the first time in months the price of bacon has shown an upward tendency in the O'd Country. Last week the best was quoted at 83 shillings per hundredweight, compared with 65 to 72 on Nov. 10. The cable published today shows that this gain has been maintained and that the market remains firm. As the price of live hogs in Canada has fluctuated almost identically with that of bacon in the Old Country in past years—though more recently following Buffalo—this advance in price increases the water may be the forerunner of an advance in live hog prices here. On the other hand, the tendency at Buffalo is toward slightly lower values.

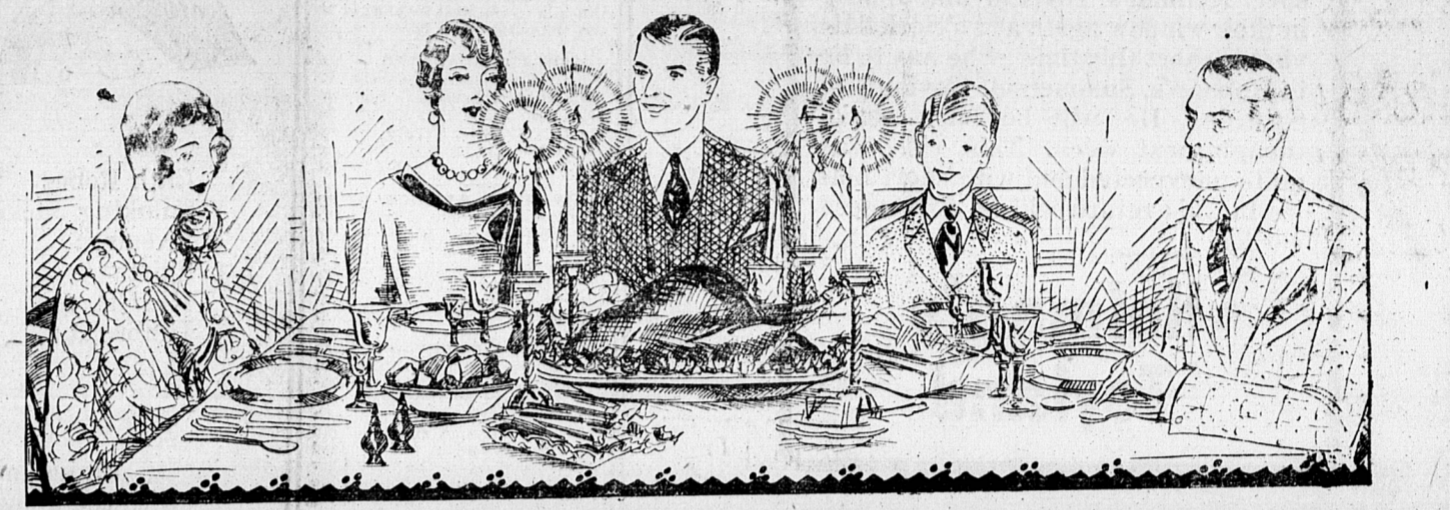
PRINCE IN MOVITONE

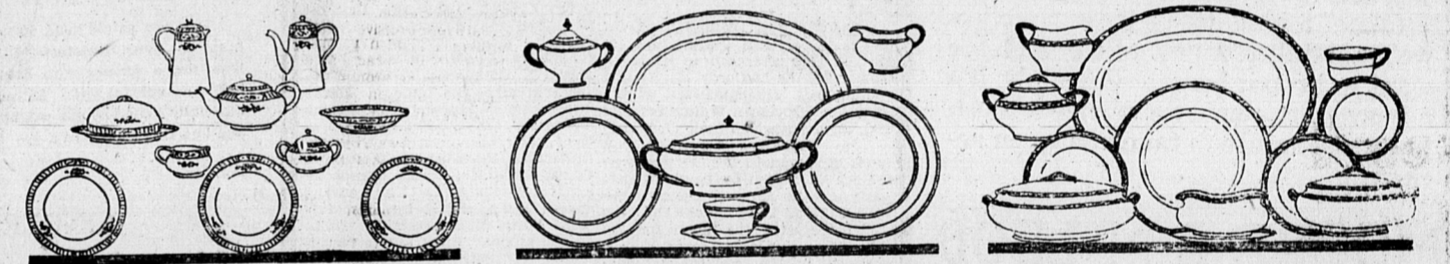
