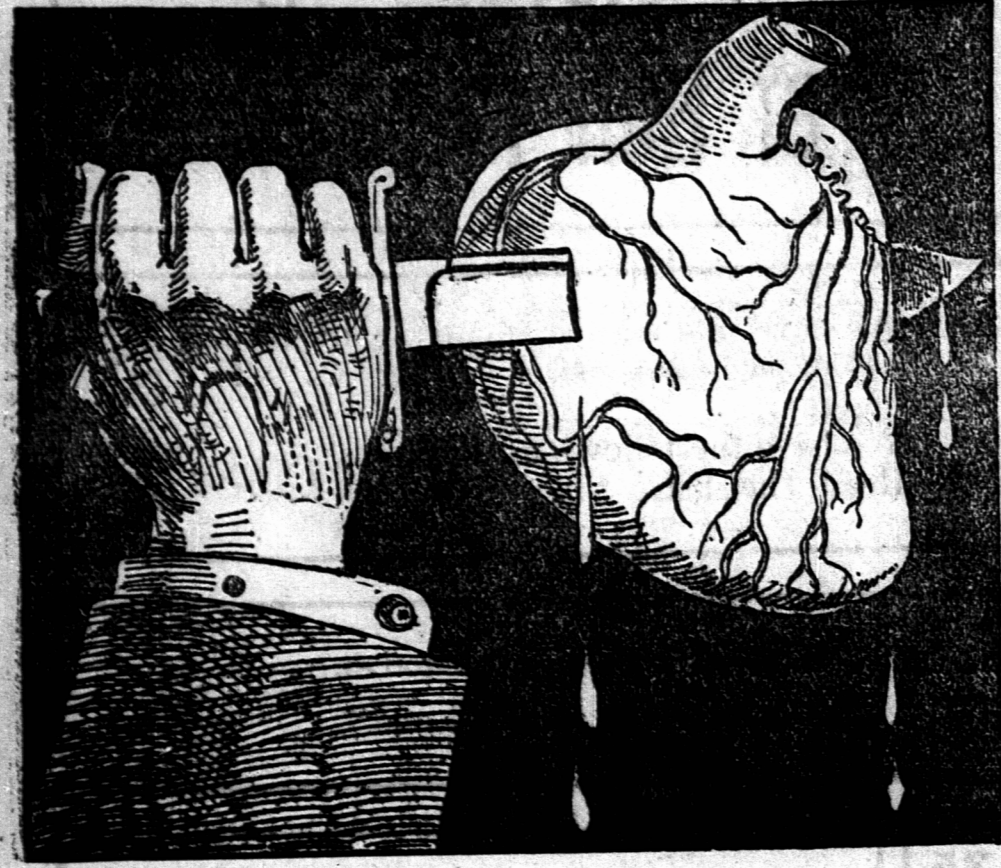

Contract Let.

On Thursday, May 30th, a meeting of the Directors of the Comstock Gold Mining Co., was held and the Manager authorized to go ahead with work just as vigorously as possible. A Contract to drive a development tunnel has been let and no delays will be made in prosecuting the work.

The Dominion Govt. has granted the Canadian Pacific Railway \$96,000 for the Lordeau Branch Line and the Lordeau newspapers just to hand say it is likely trains will be running to Trout Lake (our shipping point) by November.

The bounty on Lead puts us on a level with the American producers of Silver-Lead Ores and altogether an investment in Comstock shares looks very promising for big returns on a small outlay. Shares are 10 cents each, \$100 for 1000 shares.
