METHODIST MEETING - The annual district meeting of the Summerside district of the Methodist Church met in the Epworth Hall of the church in Summerside on Tuesday morning, the 5th June, at 10 a. m. The Rev. George F. Dawson, M. A., of Alberton, in the chair. The ministerial session opening with the hymn, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing," after which the Rev. R. Brodie of Maddock and the Rev. L. F. Leard of Granville, led in prayer. The roll call was answered by the Rev. J. M. Rice, of Summerside, G. Ayers, of Bedouque, George A. Sellar, of Margate, H. S. Young, B. A. J. Bedouque, George F. Dawson, of Alberton, and R. Brodie, of Maddock. Rev. George Morris, B. A., of Tryon, came in later. Rev. George Ayers was elected secretary and Rev. Geo. Sellar assistant. The Rev. Mr. A. Thomson, of Crapaud, and W. E. Johnson, of Margate, were excused from being absent. The moral relations, doctrinal views of each minister were past as correct. The Revs. W. A. Thomson and W. E. Johnson were recommended to be continued as supernumerary ministers. After which an earnest conversation on the work of God was held. The session adjourned at 12 a. m., to meet again at 2 p. m. This session opened by singing "Go, Labor On." Mr. E. H. Wright, layman from Tryon circuit led in prayer. The Rev. G. Morris was appointed to report on measures to be adopted for increasing the efficiency of the work of God in order to place same before the annual district meeting. The remainder of the afternoon was spent over the business of the district for the year just ending. The Rev. George Morris closed this session in prayer. At 7 p. m., the session again met with the addition of the following laymen: J. A. Brace, Summerside; C. Wright, Bedouque; E. H. Wright, Tryon; L. Crossman, O'Leary; J. W. Bentley, Margate; C. McKay, Bideford; G. M. Leard, Alberton. The proceedings, "Go, Labor On." Mr. E. H. Wright and the Rev. H. S. Young led in prayer. The record of the ministerial session was then read over. The Rev. R. Brodie and Mr. E. Wright were appointed to audit the schedules. The secretary followed by reading the various receipts of the circuits which revealed an increase in the Educational, Social Service, Sunday Schools, Women's Missionary, funds, etc. The report of the number of church members also showed an increase. During the evening the laymen retired and elected delegates to the annual conference which meets in Moncton, N. B. on 13th June. The Rev. G. IN MEMORIAM - OBITUARY REV. JOHN GILLIS - The subject of this sketch, the late Rev. John Gillis, was born at Lyndale, Queen's Co., P.E.I., March 20th 1839. When a young man he was engaged in farming near St. Peter's, where as his future testified, he unmistakably heard the call of God to preach the gospel. After his college work in Monmouth, Ill., he entered McCormack seminary, Chicago, and spent a year in that institution. Before the seminary opened next year Chicago was almost wiped out by its terrible fire. So Mr. Gillis went to New York City and finished his theological course in Union Seminary. He was ordained by New York Presbytery in 1873 and sent by that Presbytery as a missionary to the Semipole Indians in Indian territory. A year later he returned to Prince Edward Island in poor health, and for the winter supplied the Marshfield congregation.

The following year he went to Scotland and remained nine years ministering to the congregations in the parishes first of Knock in Isle of Lewis for a year and later Appin in Argyleshire for eight years. He then returned to Canada and was called to St. Andrew's Church, Eldon, Ont., and later to St. Andrew's Church, Paisley, Ont. His next pastorate was in Dundas, P.E.I., for four years. Here a great sorrow visited his home, when three of his family succumbed to the dreaded disease, diphtheria. He then ministered to the congregation of Murray Harbor North for three years, when he went West and spent four years as pastor of Dominion City, Man. He returned to P. E. I., and was pastor of the Strathalbyn church for over five years. He was then called to his last pastorate Wood Islands, where he ministered till the fall of 1916, when at his own request he retired from the active work of the ministry and moved to Southport. He was strong and vigorous during the winter, and was planning to resume active work in the spring. For the three Sabbaths before he died he was to supply the church of Ureka, N.S. He supplied two most acceptably, before the third he was taken ill through cold, and returned home seriously sick. He had the best medical skill, and was tenderly cared for by his faithful wife, and a nurse, but on May first he passed peacefully away. Mr. Gillis was married the year he was ordained, 1873, to Miss Susie McAnuff of New York. She was indeed a

worthy helpmate, sharing with him during these forty-four years, his joys and sorrows, also making the home a place where those who were once their guests were anxious to return. She was also an inspiration to him in his church work. This worthy woman and three children survive him, one died in infancy, the three above referred to when almost grown up. The three surviving children are Robert and Alice in Calgary and Sadie in Hong Kong, China. On retiring from the ministry, suitable resolutions were passed by the Presbytery commendatory of the life and labors of a fellow presbyter. In his death the Presbytery has lost a brother whose wise counsel will be greatly missed. There has passed away a man of noble Christian character, an earnest gospel preacher, a faithful pastor, a loving husband, a father and friend. His voice is still in death, but to many he still speaks through the influence of his teaching and Christian manhood. Funeral services were held at his home in Southport on the third of May, conducted by Dr. McEwen of the Orwell Church, and Dr. Fullerton of Charlottetown. His remains were taken to Dundas, where Rev. J. M. McLeod, M.A., of St. Peter's conducted the services, and was laid to rest beside his children. Mr. McLeod also held a memorial service in his own church at St. Peter's on the following Sunday, in honor of his friend, where Mr. Gillis was well known and loved. One friend and brother has gone on to join the "ones loved and lost a while." He now sees the King and His Kingdom, and he gazes not at glory, but on the King of Grace, not at the crown He giveth, but on His pierced hand, for the Lamb is all the glory of the Father and friend.
