PERMANENT INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION PROPOSED

OTTAWA, March 18.—The appointment of a permanent industrial commission is being considered by the Minister of Labor, the Hon. T. W. Crothers and it is quite possible that the legislation to give effect to it will be brought down next session. The function of the body will be adjustment of disputes between capital and labor and it would replace the conciliation boards now appointed from time to time under the industrial disputes act. Of the latter, a new one is created for each dispute. It is felt by the Minister that a permanent commission exercising wide powers and making its inquiry in open court would command a greater respect for its awards than is now possible under the present system, which is only partial.

ENGLAND ENTERS THREE MOTOR BOATS

NEW YORK, March 18.—England will be represented by a full team of three motor boats in the next best summer for the Harmsworth international trophy. The boats selected are all hydroplanes, owned by Dan Hanbury, Mackay Edgar, and the Marquis of Anglesey. The most powerful engines of the trio are in the Edgar boat, which is rated at 600 horse power.

France is to be represented for the first time by a 1,000 horse power Panhard boat, about which some remarkable rumors have been circulated.

Just what sort of a craft the chief American challenger will be has not yet been determined, but it is said a new boat of the Dixie type will be put in the field.

The winning boat, it is figured, will have to make an average close to forty knots an hour over the entire course.

REGRETS ATTEMPT ON LIFE OF KING.

ROME, March 15.—Pope Pius when he was notified by Cardinal Merry Del Val of the attempt on the King's life expressed his deep regret and said: "These are the consequences of the irreligion of our times."

Antonio Dalba's mother, when seen, after the outrage, declared that her son, when a boy, had suffered severely from influenza, pneumonia and meningitis, which had left him weak minded. Within three months he was due to be called up for military service.

According to Italian law, Antonio Dalba, now yet being of full age cannot be condemned to penal service for life, the most severe punishment meted out to him, cannot exceed thirty years.

The revolver used by Dalba is a most formidable weapon. It is a foot in length and contains six chambers of large calibre. Its probable purchasing value would be \$30, and this roused the suspicion of the police that Dalba had received it from some one else for the purpose of committing the outrage.

Dalba when interrogated at the Police Station as to how he became possessed of the weapon, answered that he had found it. From his disconnected replies to questions, it was not possible for the authorities to gather much information.

A KIDNAPPED BOY RESTORED.

LONDON, March 18.—Romantic circumstances surround the restoration to its mother of a seven-year-old boy kidnapped from her five years ago by the alleged father.

Three months ago the boy was left with the Norwich Union authorities by a man who said that the child had been deserted by its mother. He gave the names of the mother and child, and stated that the latter was born at Saffron Walden. Efforts to trace the mother failed, and the Norwich Guardians obtained a Justice's order for the child's removal to Saffron Walden Union as its birth-settlement.

The relieving officer at Saffron Walden is also registrar of births, and recalling to mind the woman who registered the baby seven years previously, he set out to find her. He traced her to Bishop's Stortford and then to Colchester, where eventually he located her, now a married woman with two children. She said the child was taken away from her father and she did not know what had since happened to it. Her pleasure at learning that the child was still alive was very evident. When her husband returned from work she told him. He cheerfully acknowledged his legal guardianship, and the child's family now a happy member of the little family.

MURDER TRIAL WILL BE SENSATIONAL

HALIFAX, Mar. 19.—The murder trial of Ada McCarron, charged with burning her baby girl alive in a stove in the parlor of her house, Gerriah street, on February 3rd, promises to be the most sensational, in supreme court annals in Halifax.

It will be remembered that at the preliminary hearing before Stipendiary Fielding on February 19th, 20th and 21st, the crown had only three witnesses. The defense, on that occasion put up a strong fight to have the woman acquitted because of insanity and lack of proof that the crime was committed by her.

She was committed, however, and will be tried for murder by the supreme court, which opens on Tuesday.

Since the preliminary hearing the counsel for both sides have been making preparations for the trial.

The crown, it is understood, has subpoenaed a number of witnesses, both black and white, and some of the evidence promises to be of a most startling character.

It is understood the counsel for the defense will direct most of his attention to endeavoring to prove the woman insane.

The crime—one of the most heinous ever committed in Halifax—the burning alive in the stove of a helpless and innocent baby girl—has caused more interest in Halifax and throughout the province than any crime that has been committed in Nova Scotia for many years—if ever.

DEATH TOLL IN CHANNEL CRASH.

LONDON, Mar. 18.—Seven of the passengers and three Europeans of the crew of the Peninsular and Oriental Steamship Oceana were drowned, while being rescued after the collision, in the English Channel of that vessel on Saturday with the German bark Pisagua, which was afterwards taken to Dover in a sinking condition.

The Peninsular and Oriental Company today says that several Larsons belonging to the crew were also drowned. Their number is not known but only a few of them went down with a capsized small boat.
