MILLINERS from all over the maritime provinces have arrived for the opening, says the St. John Star, and have swelled the list of guests at the principal hotels, to almost double the usual number.

THE schooner Carrie Easler, which left Canso for Yarmouth on February 20th has not arrived at her destination and fear is entertained that the vessel has been lost. The vessel was commanded by Captain Rafuse, of Liverpool, and carried four seamen beside the mate, John McCormack, 24 years of age of Charlottetown, formerly of S. S. Amethyst, was steward.

W. FRANK HATHERWAY, St. John, has turned his activity from the Tea business into that of writing books. He has a book now in press, entitled "Canadian Nationality." By this book he hopes to make Canadians feel the responsibility of citizenship which he contends is the basis of patriotism. Mr. Hatherway's book of Essays will be out in April and should appeal to that sentiment of Nationality which lies at the basis of all true progress.

Quite a number of the local Knights of Columbus left St. John Thursday night for Antigonish and Halifax, in each of which places a new council of the order is to be instituted. The party will make the round trip and will be increased in number by the addition of knights from North Shore points, P. E. Island and Nova Scotia. The new councils are starting with good membership and under good circumstances. They will make five councils of the order in the maritime provinces where less than a year and a half ago there was but one.

DEATH has removed one of the oldest and most respected residents of New London North in the person of the late William Cole. The deceased though in his 80th year was in his usual good health up to a few days of his death. On Feb. 24th he retired to rest in his usual good health. Early next morning he was taken with an attack of heart failure. Medical aid was summoned and he soon regained consciousness. But it was seen that the end was near. In spite of medical aid and loving kindness he sank gradually till his spirit departed this life on March 1st. The funeral which took place to the cemetery at John Geddie Memorial church on the 3rd was very largely attended. The deceased was up to the time of his death a man of unusually good health. His wife, Mary Doughart died ten years ago leaving three daughters, two of whom survived; their father, the other daughter Anne having died five years ago. The surviving daughters are Mary, the wife of Wm. A. Doughart, Long River, and Margaret at home. But Margaret was not long to be spared after her father. On the day following the funeral she was taken with an attack of congestion which was followed by pneumonia. Hopes were retained for her recovery till Saturday when it was seen that life for her was rapidly drawing to a close and her spirit departed this world on Saturday morning March 11th. The deceased was 51 years of age. She had waited on her father with a tenderness and kindness borne only of Christian fortitude and never ending love for her earthly parents. The funeral, which took place on the 12th to the family plot beside her father, was one of the largest ever seen in this section of the province. The ceremonies of both funerals were conducted by Revs. A. D. Stirling and John Murray. The surviving sister Mrs. Doughart has the sympathy of the community in the hour of her bereavement.
