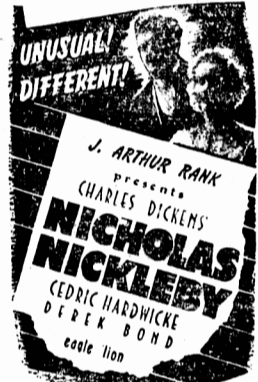

Lost Leg As Flyer, Now Has Own Plane

EDMONTON, Jan. 25 - (CP) - Bob Comeau's flying career during the war ended with the loss of a leg and a spell in a German prison camp. When he returned to Canada and took a job as an interviewer in the casualty rehabilitation section of the department of veterans' affairs here, flying regulations prevented him from taking to the air as a pilot again.

However, now that he has an artificial leg and regulations have relaxed, he has acquired a private pilot's licence which permits him to fly dual-controlled aircraft. He is accompanied on his flights by his wife, but still too young to enjoy the air are Comeau's four-year-old twin boys. They haven't as yet made up their minds whether or not they would like to follow their father's footsteps. Mr. Comeau flies an Ercoupe aircraft. It has two seats side by side and there are no rudder pedals. Instead the controls are all synchronized in the control wheel. His instructor, Jack Ross, said he has seldom had more satisfaction in checking out a man on a solo flight than he had when Bob Comeau fulfilled his desire to fly again.

DDT FOR GREENHOUSES

DDT aerosols have been effective in controlling thrips, certain aphids, young mealybugs, roaches, field crickets, sowbugs, centipedes, leaf tiers and leaf miners, rose midges and chrysanthemum midges in greenhouses. In recent tests three and one-quarter ounces of DDT in a special aerosol formulation containing Freon refrigerant gas, as the propellant, was sufficient for 1,000 cubic feet.

MINERALS IMPROVE VALUE OF FEEDS

With feed costs as high as they are, economy has become a big factor in feeding animals. Recent experiments showed farm animals made the fullest use of all feed compounds only when fed a balanced ration. In other words, unless a proper supply of minerals is fed, the animals may not get maximum food value out of concentrates and roughage. For example, tests proved that a phosphorus deficiency decreased the utilization of feed by lambs more

Voters lists have been prepared for the Civic Election to be held on Wednesday, February 11th, 1948, and will be posted for the inspection of all electors at the City Court Room, City Building, up to and including February 5th, 1948, from 11 a. m. to 5:30 p.m. daily.

Voters are advised to ascertain that their names are properly listed in all Wards in which they are qualified to vote

VOTING QUALIFICATIONS (General)

All males and females must be:—

- (a) 21 years of age and upwards. (b) Resident of City for One Year (except (4) below). (c) British Subjects. (d) Not in arrears on December 31st, 1947, for Civic Rates, Taxes or Assessments.

And must be also qualified under one of the following:—

- (1) Owner of freehold of lands or premises for 3 months previous to the Election to the value of One Hundred Dollars. (2) (Males) Tenant or occupant for 3 months at annual rental value of Fourteen Dollars. (3) (Males) Have paid Poll Tax of Five Dollars for 1947 on or before December 31st, 1947. (4) Male or female, non-resident but otherwise qualified as above, if doing business and occupying business premises in the City. If qualification is freehold, to vote only in Ward or Wards where freehold lies, otherwise only in Ward of business occupancy.

MULTIPLE VOTING—

Persons voting on sections (1) and (2) as above may vote in each Ward in which they are so qualified.

Persons voting on section (3) may vote only in the Ward of which they are resident.

Property or rental qualification sufficient in time but having removed from one Ward to another within 3 months next preceding date of Election entitles vote in former Ward only.

than it decreased the consumption. Many mineral deficiencies in livestock result from similar deficiencies in the soils in which feed crops are grown, states R. E. Cudmore of C-I-L's agricultural chemicals division. He points out that while the application of proper fertilizers may eventually solve the problem, it is important to feed a mineral supplement in the meantime. Most of these contain all the essential minerals needed by livestock. Since mineral deficiencies arise from soil conditions which vary from one country to another, it is impossible to provide a separate mineral supplement for each local

ized area. This is overcome in recommended commercial mixtures by including a plentiful supply of minerals to cover a particular class of livestock. The broad range of minerals also enables animals to make full use of their feed.
