## Buy 220 Holsteins For Britain At Record Breaking Price

Ottawa, Aug. 9.—In order to introduce new blood into the herds of its members the British Friesian Cattle Society, London, England has just completed the purchase of 220 head of outstanding Canadian Holsteins at a cost of over half a million dollars.

The average price paid for the farm was the record-breaking figure of \$2,037 which with handling and transportation costs, is increased to approximately \$2,300, delivered in Great Britain. The cattle were selected in the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba, and Alberta and will go to breeders in all parts of Great Britain.

This is the highest average price or total ever paid for any single shipment of Holstein-Friesian cattle ever exported from Canada, and the animals qualifying for it met the highest specifications ever established for a large scale importation. They included milk and total butterfat records at least 25 per cent above record of Friesian requirements on the three nearest female ancestors of all the bulls chosen and on the two nearest dams of heifers.

### High Records

Service sires had to meet the same requirements as bulls that were purchased. In addition, no record, regardless of total milk, with a test of less than 3.7 percent butterfat considered.

The buying delegation consisted of Messrs. E. Radcliffe, Alastair Munro, Frank Terry and the newly appointed Secretary of the British Friesian Society, W. H. Bury.

The entire selection consisted of 54 bulls, 8 milking heifers, 19 open heifers and 99 open heifers. The highest price paid was \$10,000 to Hays Limited, Calgary and Brampton, for Hays' Geben Agate, two-year-old daughter of Alcatraz Geben, world champion yearly butterfat producer with 1,406 pounds fat. Geben Agate is sired by Hays' Three Nine Steps whose dam is Hays' Snowden Lady, with a 10 lactation total of 10,121 lbs. milk containing 1,185 lbs. fat, average test, 4.12 percent, butterfat.

### Top Bull

The top bull was Glenafon Rag Admiral, secured from T. O. Dolan, Brantford, Ont. He is a three-year-old son of the famed three times All-Canadian aged bull, Montvic Rag Apple, Markman, who is out of Montvic Rag Apple Colantha Abhekerk, the North American Holstein champion for yearly production on three-times-a-day milking with 1,283 lbs. fat. The dam of "Admiral" is Rag Apple Freedom, has been twice champion in Selective Registration, and has a yearly record of 158 lbs. fat from 10 lactations, average test 4.21 percent, butterfat.

The three highest priced bulls of the shipment were sired by "Markman" and of all six of his sons were purchased, including one from S. J. Hammond and son, St. Paul's Station; C. C. Haviland, Wiltonville; L. A. Everett and son, Simcoe; Beneteau Bros., Amherstburg; Norman R. McArthur, Thamesville; and Allan H. Gilmour, Burgessville, including also five sons and one daughter of Montvic Rag Apple Sovereign; and two daughters of Montvic Rag Apple Commander; two sons and one daughter of Montvic Rag Apple Ajax; and two sons and six daughters of Montvic Rag Apple Achilles.

### 7 Daughters

Conspicuous amongst the group were seven daughters of Inka Supreme Reflection, who is, now in service in the Artificial Breeding Club in Leeds County. All bred by Dr. H. McCaugherty and Son, Streetsville.

It is expected that the entire selection will go to Britain in three shipments, one now on its way in the Fall and another next Spring. The departure of many of the younger heifers is being possibly delayed so they may be bred to outstanding sires before shipment.

A total of 96 breeders contributed animals. The largest individual consignment of 19 head was from Rockwood Holsteins, St. Norbert, Manitoba, and included their first prize heifer calf and Reserve Junior Champion at Calgary and Edmonton, Parthena Carstairs Rockwood, Hays Limited, supplied 11 head; Douglas Hart, Woodstock, 10 head; W. H. McCaugherty, Normansville, 8 head; Thornton and Son, Thamesford; Norman C. Schell, Woodstock and E. R. Henderson, Portmouth, 9 each; Smith Hays, Woodstock, 8; W. Dennis, St. Thomas; and E. A. Innes, Brantford, five each; Macdonald College, Normansville, 4; Arthur, Thamesford; Fred L. Schell, Woodstock; Hugh Ormiston, Brooklin; and F. H. Caldwell, Carp, 4 each.

## New Service Helps Youth Select Jobs

TORONTO, Aug. 8.—(CP)—Girls aged between the ages of 16 and 21, hesitating on the threshold of the business world, are being helped over the hurdle of finding their first job by the Youth Employment Centre operating here under the National Employment Service.

Interest in the centre, which was opened two months ago, has a ready response to other parts throughout Canada and plans are underway to develop similar bureaux in Montreal, Winnipeg, and possibly in Vancouver.

It was largely through the work of B. G. Sullivan, Ontario Regional Superintendent of the N. E. S. and of Miss Mary Edie, acting supervisor of the centre, that this effort to direct Canadian youth into suitable employment was initiated. They saw that not only are young people at a loss to know how to begin when looking for their first job, but also with the return of Canada's war veterans, girls, who during the war of

the place of men in banks, stores and offices, found themselves unemployed with the coming of peace. Boys who had dropped out of school to work in war plants found themselves with neither sufficient education nor experience to take worthwhile jobs.

One of the problems of the centre is to re-educate these young workers to the fact that the world in normal times usually means beginning at the bottom and working up.

### Given Good Advice

"We aim to give these young persons self-confidence and send them to jobs for which they are suited," said Miss Edie. "Each youngster is interviewed by a counsellor well equipped to give advice on any subject."

Physical handicaps such as poor eyesight and deafness also are considered and such boys and girls are sent to jobs to which they can most easily be fitted.

Miss Edie said she hoped eventually young people would be taught in school how to approach a prospective employer. She said for the most part they are timid and many of them seem to be telling what they are able and like to do.

From the fact that fewer girls have registered at the centre than boys it would seem to continue longer with their education than the boys.

At the present time, Miss Edie said young people generally are approaching the problem of saving school "very thoughtfully" and several of them have visited the

centre to confer with her before deciding definitely to forego the classroom for the office.
