Not a hundred spectators were present, but those that were, witnessed a game that, and no slow moments and was not without its thrills. There were many skaters in the rink waiting to take the ice, and it was delayed to let the tie stand and be replayed Wednesday night at Kensington when a large crowd will follow the Beavers to cheer them on their third victory. There were no outstanding players on either team each man put forward his best efforts at all times. Kensington is determined that the score will be something nothing in their favor Wednesday night, while the Beavers are quite satisfied that matters will remain otherwise. The refereeing of Layton Rogers of Kensington comes in for special mention, as his handling of a hard game was excellent at all times. The Beavers were handicapped by the fact that two of their star players, Noonan and Clark, were absent by sickness, they were compelled to play the sixty minutes with a spare. 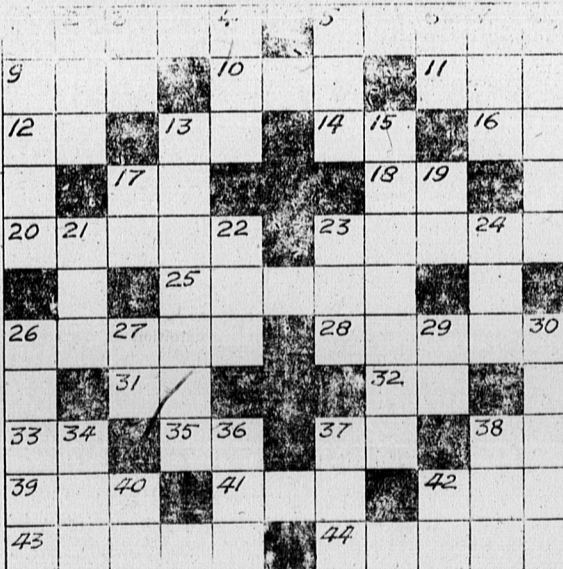

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CROSS-WORD PUZZLE



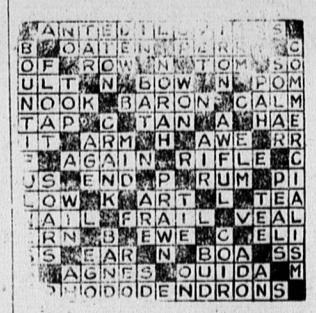
