Mr. Swindells has gone into dairying on a very extensive scale at Princeport, where three years ago he purchased a farm of 400 acres, built two large barns, each 135 x 36, and other buildings, and is establishing what he aims to make one of the best dairy herds in the Maritime Provinces, if not in Canada. He is a great believer in Guernsey cattle, and in his opinion they are the foremost dairy breed, being so recorded, he says, in the United States. He purchased the herd of the late Howard W. Corning, and Wednesday purchased twenty head from Roper Bros., 18 females and two males, including the Grand Champion bull "Lanwater Marston," which carried off the highest honours at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto last year. The animals have all been prize winners at the various fairs both in this province and in other parts of Canada. Mr. James F. Roper will ship the cattle about the first of June.

should impose such confidence after four years of office and for my part I thank you humbly and heartily for your resolutions of confidence. It gives great moral support to the people, to know that they have been watching and appreciating what we have been doing. Our record is an open book and it will not be necessary to detail the facts. Certain issues are again before the people and we are not ashamed to be put on trial. However more than the government is on trial we have to choose between two governments or two parties the Liberal government of 1919 which was made up practically of the same Liberal representatives who are now appealing to you and our government. You must make your choice as to which of these governments or parties you are going to support. Certain proposals will be submitted to you, those are merely promises. What you are interested in is performance, which of the two parties are you to believe. You have the records of the two. In 1919 the Liberal party placed before you a very elaborate platform. In 1923 we were able to take the platform and show that hardly one of the promises of the 1919 Liberal platform were carried out. In 1926 we placed a platform before you, a very moderate one, and I leave it to you to judge if we have not during our four years of office so far as is humanly possible implemented our platform 100 percent. One of the planks in that platform was that we would press our claims at Ottawa. The same plank was in the Liberal platform of 1919 but what did the Liberals do about it. According to the admission of Premier Bell himself during his last year of office all they did was to write a letter to the Premier of Nova Scotia and as that gentleman was thinking about retiring from office he received no encouragement from that source. He also wrote the Premier of New Brunswick and got

no assistance from him. When we were these preachers for the last eight years. Why were they not seeing to the enforcement of the law. Why were they not going into the schools and preaching temperance to the young. How many of them left their pulpits or their business during the last eight years to preach temperance. They have been suddenly galvanized into action through politics. Up to two years ago every province in Canada but Quebec had prohibition but we have yet to hear of any political parties to go back to the old law.

The Premier then referred to the alternative policy proposed by the Liberals and dealt with the matter fully. Premier Stewart then congratulated the convention upon nominating the standard bearers who had in the past successfully upheld the policies of the Conservative party and who during the past four years had given such splendid service to the government. I will not presume to say anything for that splendid old father of the Conservative party, the Hon. James A. MacNeill. A more loyal friend or citizen and a gentleman of finer principles or with a finer record could not be found in this province. In Mr. Pope you have selected a man who comes of a family who have long served this province and during this diamond jubilee year we have special reasons to remember the splendid services of that family not only to this province but to Canada at large. Mr. Pope has been a most attentive representative, constant in his support to the government, giving the best that is in him not only to his constituency but to the province at large. It is hardly necessary to say anything for my French Canadian friend the Hon. A. F. Arsenault. His attractive manners and gentlemanly bearing was a great assistance in submitting our claims at Ottawa. The preparation of the brief was presented was in a large measure due to his assistance. Mr. McNutt represents a type of citizen of which we are so sorry there are so few in parliament. He is one of the representative farmers of the province. Of fine steady habits, always on the job, he brings a high intelligence to our conferences. I feel that these two districts are pretty safe for the Liberal-Conservative party. However, the candidates cannot elect themselves and they must have behind them the absolute efforts of their followers which means hard work. We will submit what we believe to be for the best interests of the people moral and otherwise. I ask you to eliminate all prejudices, set aside all misstatements and study our platform. Concluding one of the best speeches of his career Premier Stewart said whichever way you vote the present government will be satisfied to take the result.

After short speeches by His Worship Mayor Arnett, Mr. D. B. MacDonald, President of the East-Prince Conservative Association, and Hon. J. E. Wyatt, K. C., one of the most successful Conservative conventions ever held in Summerside concluded with three cheers and a tiger for Premier Stewart, the able candidates and victory.
