POTATO CROP IMPROVED—The prevailing drying winds have continued to prevent an outbreak of potato late blight and the crop, so far as this disease is concerned, is in a healthier condition at the present time than it has been in many years, reports the Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology. The low humidity, the infrequent dews, the lack of rain, the winds and sun, have provided conditions unsuitable to the organism responsible for the disease. Most fields have been sprayed or dusted a number of times for blight control, and it is suggested that no further applications be made so long as present weather conditions persist. Flea beetles are becoming quite scarce, especially in fields that have been sprayed with DDT. It will be unnecessary to apply any more poison this season.

German Stowaway Is Apprehended

TROY, N.Y., Sept. 7 — (AP) — An escaped German war prisoner, who parlayed an afternoon stroll in an English village to a stowaway trip to the United States on the luxury liner Queen Mary, says "it was not easy."
Martin Eppich, 21, once a corporal in the German 12th panzer division, told police after his capture Saturday that he did not eat and could not "even sit up" in his lifeboat hideout on the trans-Atlantic Odyssey.
Apprehended on an upstate county road, he said he was sorry his flight had ended because he desired to stay in the United States.
Eppich, captured by Canadian forces near Caen, France, a month after D-day in 1944, said he planned to escape and make his way to North America a few weeks before he finally walked away while

Plum production will be plentiful—about 145,000 tons compared to the 1937-46 average of 108,000. Additional plum jam already has been promised British householders on the basis of this crop.
Vegetables are plentiful, with good yields of tomatoes, cucumbers, peas, cauliflower, beans, cabbage, beetroot and celery already being harvested.
Dry bulb onions often hard to obtain in recent years, are slow in maturing and yields are likely to be below average.

BRITAIN EXPECTS HUGE APPLE CROP

LONDON Sept. 10 — (CP) — Britain expects to harvest the best apple crop in her history—without having any more to eat.
The Agriculture Ministry estimates production of dessert and cooking apples at more than 500,000 tons, compared with the largest previous crop of 425,000 tons in 1939, and an average of 250,000 tons in the years 1937 and 1946.
Food ministry officials said however increased eating apple supplies could not be counted on. Imported apples supply many British tables with the bulk at present from Canada, which supplies 963,748 hundredweight worth \$1,809,536 (\$30,438,104) in the first six months of 1947. Under dollar conservation restrictions these imports are likely to be reduced.
The British crop of cider apples will be between 70,000 and 75,000 tons, about the long term average crop, and less than the 110,000 tons harvested in 1946.
The pear crop will be above average.
