All inmates still continue to enjoy the best of health and it requires but a few days in the Home to prove on a new arrival the excellent care and treatment received.

During the month the Home has been given a much-needed house cleaning which entailed some expense but the great improvement in the appearance of the Institution well justifies it.

Quite recently the members of the Women's Institute of the Province while attending their convention in the City, were, through the generosity of many public spirited car owners, giving an opportunity of visiting the Institution; a great many came over and we sincerely hope their trip was enjoyable, educational and of real benefit to all concerned.

On the evening of June 10th the Young Peoples' League of Pownal assisted by Rev. Mr. Littlejohns, gave an entertainment in the Home for the benefit of the Orphanage; the Hall was well filled and the sum of \$33.65 was realized. We wish here to compliment every performer on the excellent rendering of their several parts and also to thank the League for their turning over the entire proceeds.

Interesting Talk On the Telegraph

The students in the Commercial Department of Notre Dame Academy were given a talk on "The Telegraph in Business" by Mr. J. M. Murley of the Western Union Telegraph Company this week.

In the course of his explanation as to the inestimable value of the telegraph in conducting a modern business, Mr. Murley outlined the inception and growth of many recognized labor saving devices in the office and the home. "These devices are valuable insofar as they are able to save time and expense and the telegraph in this respect is in the forefront of all such devices," said the speaker.

"Business telegrams are used primarily for two purposes," said Mr. Murley, "to initiate a transaction or to reply to such an overture. It is not good business to confine one's activity to the first class of messages, we should always bear in mind that when a message is received implying an answer, such answer should be forthcoming at once, especially when it is negative as your correspondent cannot very well make his offer elsewhere until his negotiation with you has definitely failed."

The various classes of telegrams and cable messages were then explained as well as the Money Transfer and Errand Services.

As many of the students will shortly be graduated and absorbed into the business life of the community, the discourse was listened to with greatest attention.


