Maritime Amateur Hockey League A Probability

Mr. A. W. Covey, the newly elected President of the Maritime Province Branch of the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union "was" in Amherst yesterday. In a brief chat we mentioned hockey. Mr. Covey stated that he was unable to make any very definite announcement at this early date, but that the present outlook pointed strongly towards a Maritime Amateur Hockey League run on the section principle as baseball was worked in Nova Scotia this year. All the clubs are enthusiastic regarding the winter sport prospect and everything points towards a lively season. The "Star" Trophy, which was won by the Abbies of Charlottetown and returned by them to the trustees, will probably be available for contest again. This is not the old "Star Cup" that has figured in so many famous games, but a shield. The "Star Cup" is supposed to be at Campbellton at the present time. It might be possible to also secure the latter. However, the matter of a trophy is a minor consideration. There is no question but that at least one will be forthcoming.

Just how the various sections will be arranged is as-yet impossible to state but it is probable that the northern groups will run something like this: Fredericton, St. John, Sussex and Marysville; Charlottetown, Sackville, Amherst and Moncton. Then there will be a Central Section, a Valley Section, a Cape Breton and Eastern Section. The games will likely be run off on the "home and home" plan with a total of goals to decide the winner, thus eliminating the probability of so many play-offs. There will need to be considerable planning to get the league running but there is no reason why it cannot be done, and we are given to understand that arrangements are to be got underway without delay.

It may seem a bit early to be starting the hockey dope, but baseball is about over for this season, and it will take a lot of manipulating before the league can be finally got into running order. In the meantime a little airing of the subject will serve to instill interest, and perhaps call forth some valuable suggestions.

CHARLOTTETOWN EGG LAYING CONTEST NOTES, EXPERIMENTAL STATION

The leading pen of the contest is owned by Mrs. R. W. Bullpitt, of Cardigan, and two of her hens, Nos. 2 and 9, are now eligible for registration in the Record of Performance, having laid 153 and 163 eggs respectively. Mr. James Cain of Cardigan, has the leading pen for the week. This pen laid 55 eggs. Three pens tied for second place, namely, P. L. Campbell's of Montague, J. B. Millman's of Kensington, and J. S. Moar's, of Summerville. Each of these pens laid 52 eggs in the week. The total number of eggs laid during the week was 884, a considerable increase over the record for the previous week: Eighteen hens laid a possible of 77 eggs each during the week, 10 hens were moulting, and 16 hens were broody. Pen No. 5, owned by E. Howatt, French River, laid a possible number of eggs on Saturday. Three additional hens have now passed the 150 mark, making a total of 7 now eligible for registration in the Record of Performance. These birds are Nos. 4 and 8 in Pen 4, owned by H. L. Machon, Murray Harbour, which have each laid 150, and Hen No. 1, in Pen 15, owned by C. B. Chapman, Amherst, N. S., which laid 152 eggs. The other birds mentioned last week have added substantial gains to their records. These are No. 9 in Pen 12, owned by B. Rodd, Brackley Point Road, which has now 156 eggs to her credit, and Hen No. 5 in Pen 17, owned by F. C. Lelecheur, Murray Harbour, with 161 eggs to her credit, besides Mrs. Bullpitt's two hens previously mentioned. The competition for second place among the pens is now quite keen. The Experimental Farm Pen No. 22 has laid 1194 eggs, V. G. Fuller's pen, No. 3, 1174 eggs, J. B. Millman's pen, No. 2, 1168 eggs, F. C. Lelecheur's pen No. 17, 1160 eggs, and P. L. Campbell's pen, No. 10, 1151 eggs to date.

Dynamite Explosion Fifty Killed In

(Special to The Guardian.) LIMA, Peru, Sept. 13.—Fifty persons were reported to have been killed or injured in an explosion in Callao Bay yesterday resulting from two dynamite barges colliding. Apparently there was no serious damage to shipping in the Bay, but tops were blown off six petroleum tanks ashore and thousands of windows broken in Callao. Concussion also smashed many windows in Lima, eight miles distant from the scene of the explosion.
