## GREAT NEED FOR INTERPRETERS

LONDON, Oct. 24.—The Standard publishes the following delayed despatch from Ostend:—

"One of the greatest needs of the Allies is interpreters, for both the French and British troops. When I have been in ordinary and armoured motor cars last week we have had to make peasants go in front as guides, and have been absolutely at their mercy, with only the fear of our rifles to deter them from leading us straight to the Germans. When we invade Germany it will be still worse, for we won't be able to trust anybody. For English troops an interpreter who is English and can understand the Scotch, Welsh, Yorkshire and White-

chapel dialects is worth far more than any Frenchman or Fleming who may speak a local language better, but can seldom understand properly what the average British "Tommy" says to him.

"I regard this inexhaustible supply of men who know local languages as one of the chief factors of German efficiency in the war. The Allies need absolutely all the interpreters they can get and are suffering for lack of them. Very few British officers and hardly any soldiers speak even serviceable French. Over and over again I have myself been deliberately misled by apparent peasants, who, I felt sure, were German spies."

### SAVE THIS PROPHECY FOR FUTURE REFERENCE

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—"Germany will be driven out of France in a decisive battle to be fought between November 5 and 7; the Kaiser will be forced to relinquish his throne by the middle of next January; the Russians will be in Berlin in April, and the present European war will last about two years."

### NO NURSES WANTED FROM CANADA AT PRESENT.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—No nurses are wanted from Canada at present for service at the front and none will be sent from here to England or the Continent, unless the Department of Militia decides to send a contingent, in its with the second contingent, in which the usual complement will go. After a meeting of the Canadian relief committee held here to-day, at which the medical branch of the militia department, the Canadian Red Cross and the St. John Ambulance Association were represented, a statement to the above effect was given out.

It is also pointed out that movements, such as the one reported to be under way by Canadian women to raise money to send nurses abroad, should cease for the present, and prevent overlapping of work. The Militia Department has applications from hundreds of nurses and when the time comes will deal with them.

### MAXINE ELLIOTT AS RED CROSS NURSE.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Maxine Elliott has given a motor ambulance to the Duchess of Sutherland's Hospital Corps in France and expects to go to the front within the next few days. She will be the first American actually enlisted for Red Cross Work on the firing line.

"My ambulance and I are now awaiting orders from the Duchess, who went to the Aisne battlefield two days ago after her marriage to Maj. Fitzgerald," Miss Elliott said. "I am simply in the position of a soldier waiting for the command to go into action."

"The Duchess is now engaged in ascertaining just where her ambulance corps—which now numbers six vehicles—can be of the utmost service to the British wounded. As soon as she learns where our base is to be she will let me know."

"I am merely an unimportant member of her corps, which includes a dozen trained nurses. My ambulance is a 35-horsepower machine of the standard type and will form a unit of the Duchess of Sutherland's corps. It is impossible to give any further details at present."

To the request for a photograph of herself in Red Cross uniform, Miss Elliott replied sharply, "The present is no time to have one's pictures taken."

### WAR ORDERS WILL KEEP PLANTS BUSY.

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.—The Militia Department is busy getting ready the equipment for the second contingent. Hon. J. D. Hazen, acting Minister of Militia, with his colleagues, has been engaged night and day allocating or-

ders for the different articles required.

The aim is to distribute orders for equipment through the Dominion, so that employment may be given to as many Canadians as possible.

As many orders as possible also have been given to Canadian concerns from the British and French authorities. The Imperial Government sent Mr. Frederick Stobart to Canada to

see what Canadian goods could be secured for the army, and he, while in Montreal, gave several large orders, including one for 1,000,000 shirts. This will keep almost every Canadian shirt factory busy for months. The orders for saddles total over \$2,000,000. Other large purchases are likely to be made in Canada, thus helping to keep thousands of workmen employed here.

## Notice Regarding Dressing Hogs

As a result of Government Inspection it is absolutely necessary that more attention be given to dressing hogs for market in order to avoid refusal by Inspectors.

They insist that the head, ears and feet should be thoroughly cleaned, every hair removed, the carcass carefully washed and kept perfectly clean when handling.

Some few farmers are not splitting the hogs between the hams and are leaving the bung gut—and in some cases even the manure—in. This must be remedied also, and in future a reduction of 2 lbs. per hog will be made on all hogs reaching here dressed in this manner, as to say the least it does not look well. Hogs must be split down completely, and bung gut and refuse removed.
